Porter called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 26, 2022.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Phipps moved, Tanner seconded and the Committee voted to enter into <u>Executive Session</u> in accordance with O.C.G.A. §§ 43-1-2(k); 43-1-19(h), 43-26-5(c) and 43-26-11, to deliberate on applications and enforcement matters and to receive information on applications, investigative reports and pending cases. The motion passed unanimously.
