## P R O C E E D I N G S

1  
2 MS. SULLIVAN: Good morning, Board members and  
3 members of the public and parties who have cases before  
4 us. We're going to go ahead and call this meeting to  
5 order. My name is Rebecca Sullivan, and I am the acting  
6 Chair of the State Election Board, and we will start with  
7 an invocation and Pledge of Allegiance, which I have asked  
8 Mr. Mashburn to lead us in.

9 (Invocation)

10 (Pledge of Allegiance)

11 MS. SULLIVAN: For purposes of the record, I'd like  
12 to go ahead and take roll and establish a quorum. Ms. Le,  
13 please acknowledge your presence.

14 MS. LE: Present.

15 MS. SULLIVAN: Mr. Mashburn?

16 MR. MASHBURN: Present.

17 MS. SULLIVAN: Ms. Ghazal?

18 MS. GHAZAL: Present.

19 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. The first item on our  
20 agenda today is the introduction of a new Board member.  
21 At this time, I would like to introduce Ms. Sara Tindall  
22 Ghazal. Ms. Ghazal was appointed to the State Election  
23 Board to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of  
24 David Worley. I am not aware whether Mr. Worley is online  
25 today, but I would like to take this opportunity to thank

1 him for his 17 years of public service on the State  
2 Election Board. I have enjoyed serving alongside Mr.  
3 Worley for eight of those years, and on behalf of the  
4 Board, I would like to publicly commend him for his  
5 thoughtful, dedicated, and honorable service to the State  
6 of Georgia. I would also like to welcome Ms. Ghazal. She  
7 is an attorney and comes to us with much experience in  
8 elections, having worked for the Carter Center and the  
9 Democratic Party of Georgia, as well having been a  
10 candidate for public office. Welcome to the State  
11 Election Board, Ms. Ghazal. On behalf of the Board, I  
12 thank you for accepting your party's nomination, and we  
13 look forward to working with you. If you'd like --

14 MS. GHAZAL: Thank you so much, Chair Sullivan. And  
15 yes, just very briefly, I just wanted to reiterate your  
16 thanks to my predecessor, David Worley. He served a  
17 tremendous service for the voters of Georgia, and I have  
18 very big shoes to fill, and I look forward to working with  
19 all of you in the coming months and years.

20 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you so much. The next item on  
21 the agenda is approval of the Board meeting minutes. We  
22 have minutes for the February 24th, 2021 Board meeting and  
23 hearing as well as the April 28th, 2021 Board meeting and  
24 hearing. Those minutes have been distributed among the  
25 Board members, and we've all had an opportunity to review.

1 At this time, it would be appropriate for a motion to  
2 approve those minutes.

3 MR. MASHBURN: So move.

4 MS. LE: Second.

5 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second. Is  
6 there any discussion? All in favor, please signify by  
7 saying aye.

8 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

9 MS. SULLIVAN: Any opposed? None, and that motion  
10 carries. We're going to jump right on in to the  
11 consideration of rules to post for public comment. At  
12 this time, the Board will consider a number of amendments  
13 to the State Election Board rules to post for public  
14 comment based on the passage of Senate Bill 202. I  
15 anticipate that the Board will consider the amendment of  
16 several rules and/or new rules in our upcoming meetings.  
17 The set of rules we will consider today is only the first  
18 batch for consideration based upon the necessity of  
19 implementation of SB 202 for the upcoming municipal  
20 elections. While the Board members have received a review  
21 of the rules we will consider -- that we will consider  
22 today in advance, I will ask Mr. Germany at this time to  
23 give a brief overview of the rules. If any of the Board  
24 members have questions or would like to engage in  
25 discussion about the rules, please feel free to pose them

1 during his presentation. Mr. Germany?

2 MR. GERMANY: Thank you, Madam Chair. This is Ryan  
3 Germany. I'm the General Counsel of the Secretary of  
4 State's Office. As Ms. Sullivan said, what we're doing  
5 today or what will be in front of the Board is voting to  
6 post rules for public comment, so if -- if the Board  
7 approves that, these draft rules will be posted for public  
8 comment. The Board will then come back in about 30 days  
9 and vote on whether or not to adopt the rules, and I think  
10 Ms. Sullivan also said the rules that we're looking at  
11 today are the ones that we felt needed to be in place  
12 prior to November's municipal elections. I think there's  
13 -- there's certainly additional rules based on SB 202 that  
14 need to be done and that we're still working on, so I  
15 envision that -- that we will have a lot of these types of  
16 things in our -- in our future meetings up through next  
17 year.

18 So I'll go into the rules that -- that I'm proposing  
19 the Board post for public comment. I'm going to start  
20 with the document that's revisions to subject 183-1-12,  
21 and the -- the first one is amendment to the logic and  
22 accuracy testing. The amendments are on page 3 of the  
23 packet that was submitted to the Board, and all this does  
24 -- this is changes to 183-1-12-.08, logic and accuracy  
25 testing. SB 202 put in new rules about notification of

1 when logic and accuracy testing is happening, and so this  
2 proposed change just puts that change into rule.

3 The next change is on page 6 of the -- the packets in  
4 front of you, and it also deals with logic and accuracy  
5 testing. There was a couple of counties in November that  
6 iss -- poll pad issues, and then one county did a good job  
7 going to what we call manual ballot activation, how you  
8 can bring up a ballot using a code on the touch screen.  
9 The other county did not do as good of a job, so what we  
10 put in place here is a requirement in logic and accuracy  
11 testing to test the ballot activation part of the  
12 procedure as well, so that's on page 6.

13 The next change is in -- is on page 17 of the packets  
14 in front of you, and it is a change to rule 183-1-12-.11,  
15 which is conducting elections, and this deals with polling  
16 place wait times recordings. SB 202 put in the  
17 requirement that any polling place that has a wait time of  
18 more than an hour at any point in the day has to take  
19 certain actions to -- to basically relieve that burden  
20 prior to the next election, and so this rule puts in place  
21 how the county is to measure that or when they're going to  
22 measure it, and then how it's to be -- how that  
23 information is going to be submitted to the Secretary of  
24 State's Office.

25 The next change is on page 25 of the packet, 183-1-

1 12-.12, tabulating results. These changes go to the part  
2 of SB 202 that requires counties to submit the total  
3 number of votes they received no later than 10PM the night  
4 of the election. On page 25, the change just said as soon  
5 -- as soon as possible after the poll is closed. The poll  
6 manager shall advise the election superintendent of the  
7 total number of ballots scanned in the ballot scanner, the  
8 total number of provisional ballots issued, and the total  
9 number being cast but unscanned ballots in a scanner  
10 emergency bin. That's just going to getting -- getting  
11 the total number of ballots cast at each precinct.

12 The next change is on page 27. This deals with the  
13 part of SB 202 that says counting shall basically continue  
14 without ceasing until pro -- all properly cast ballots are  
15 processed, and we felt that we needed to define shall not  
16 cease that it allowed for reasonable and limited breaks so  
17 long as ballots continue, and it also states that if -- if  
18 there's a technical or mechanical issue or emergency  
19 circumstance that basically doesn't allow counting to  
20 continue, then the superintendent can basically declare  
21 those circumstances exist and do a report in writing to  
22 the Secretary of State, and then resume when -- when  
23 accurate and reliable counting can resume after the  
24 emergency or technical issue has been -- has been dealt  
25 with. I think the point we want to get there is yes, it

1 needs to be done as quickly as possible, but if there's  
2 some circumstance that doesn't allow for accurate and  
3 reliable counting, then obviously, that needs to be  
4 precedence towards absolving that.

5 On page 28 of the packet in front of you, publicly  
6 posting total number of ballots cast after the polls,  
7 again, that deals with the part of SB 202 that requires  
8 publicly posting the total number of ballots cast. What  
9 we're trying to think about is the best way for counties  
10 to post those numbers and then also make them available to  
11 the public, so it says that maybe they've got to post them  
12 on their website if they have one. If they do not have a  
13 website, they have to post them on the door of their  
14 headquarters, and at the same time they're posted, they  
15 have to provide those numbers to the Secretary of State's  
16 Office so that the Secretary of State can make them public  
17 in a more aggregated fashion.

18 The final proposed edit to -- to this rule, .11, is a  
19 reconciliation report on page 29 of the packet in front of  
20 you. It says no later than 30 days following the  
21 election, the superintendent shall turn into the Secretary  
22 of State a reconciliation report that reconciles the  
23 aggregate total of all ballots cast in each precinct, and  
24 any discrepancies between the ballots cast and number --  
25 and voters who received credit shall be investigated and

1 reported to the Secretary of State.

2 The next change is a change to rule 183-1-12-.13,  
3 storage of returns. It's on page 26 of your packet, and  
4 it goes to the part of SB 202 that makes ballot images a  
5 public record, and so this change clarifies that ballot  
6 images are subject to public disclosure, and the election  
7 superintendent shall retain copies of all ballot images  
8 prior to depositing election materials to the clerk of  
9 superior court to ensure the ability to provide public  
10 access to ballot images.

11 The next change is -- and I believe all the remaining  
12 changes in this chapter of the rules are in 183-1-12-.018,  
13 provisional ballots, and this is to deal with SB 202's  
14 change to provisional balloting where ballots cast out of  
15 precinct are not going to count unless they're -- until  
16 it's after 5 o'clock, and the voter submits something that  
17 says they cannot get to their precinct in time. So this  
18 changes the instructions that poll workers give -- give  
19 voters to make sure that that's clear, and those changes  
20 are on page 39, 40, 41, 42, and 43. Those are the changes  
21 to chapter -- under subject 183-1-12.

22 The other rules that we're going to propose for  
23 posting today are revisions to subject 183-1-14, which is  
24 absentee voting, and there's two changes to that. One is  
25 a change to 183-1-14-.12, eligibility of application for

1 absentee ballot. This is to deal with the changes in SB  
2 202 that change how an absentee voter is verified going  
3 from the signature verification to the driver's license or  
4 other ID-based verification, so it just clarifies on page  
5 3 of the packet that the next -- the next packet of 183-1-  
6 14 that would have to be submitted on the application with  
7 elector's name, date of birth, address, the address where  
8 the elector wishes their ballot to mailed, the number of  
9 his or her driver's license number or other allowable  
10 identification, and the signature of the applicant.

11 We also clarify in this rule that web-based tools or  
12 applications that allow people to basically submit their  
13 information online and then fill out the form that way --  
14 so basically, if you put -- if a tool lets you submit your  
15 information, and it fills out the form for you, you would  
16 then still have to print out the form, sign it, and submit  
17 it, but it just clarifies that that is allowed. However,  
18 confidential votes -- those type of tools and applications  
19 are allowed, but confidential voter information entered  
20 into these web-based tools or applications shall not be  
21 stored, sold, distributed by any entity or person nor used  
22 for any commercial purposes. If a person gives express  
23 written consent, non-confidential voter information that  
24 is entered into those tools can be stored but shall not be  
25 sold or used by any entity or person for any commercial

1 purposes. What we tried to do here was to basically  
2 mirror the provisions for third-party voter registration  
3 drivers where, you know, basically, certain material  
4 information on the registration forms can be -- can be  
5 kept when given the consent of the voter, but confidential  
6 information, of course, cannot be kept under any  
7 circumstance.

8 This -- this rule also talks about the disclaimer  
9 that now has to be on absentee ballot applications that  
10 are -- that are sent around by third parties, and it has  
11 the disclaimer that's in SB 202, and it clarifies --  
12 essentially copying some of the regulations from the  
13 Federal Election Commission about disclaimers on election  
14 or other political mail. That disclaimer shall be  
15 sufficient font size and be clearly readable -- the 12-  
16 point type satisfies that size requirement -- be contained  
17 in a printed box set apart from the other content  
18 communications, and be printed with a reasonable degree of  
19 color contrast between the background and printed  
20 disclaimer. The regulation clarifies that the color  
21 contrast requirement is satisfied if it is printed in  
22 white text on a back -- on a black background or if the  
23 degree of contrast between the background color and the  
24 disclaimer text color is as least as great as the degree  
25 of contrast between the background color and the color of

1 the largest text in the communication. And again, I  
2 believe that's -- that's essentially copying kind of  
3 disclaimer regulations that are from the Federal Election  
4 Commission and that you would normally see on political  
5 mailings.

6 The final rule that we're proposing for posting today  
7 is a new rule, 183-1-14-.12. Sorry, 183-1-14-.14, and  
8 this deals with early absentee ballot processing. This  
9 largely mirrors the emergency rule that was put in place  
10 last year, and then SEB 202 put in early ballot processing  
11 into Georgia code, and so this rule puts in place the --  
12 the regulations for observation, for reconciliation, for  
13 making sure that basically kind of voter privacy is kept  
14 during this time, and that -- and it puts in regulations  
15 including oaths of anybody who is participating in that --  
16 in this process to ensure that no results are -- are, of  
17 course, received or even kind of guessed or estimated by  
18 anybody talking about this process.

19 So those are the changes we're posting today, as  
20 Chair Sullivan said -- or I'm proposing that the Board  
21 post for public comment today. As Chair Sullivan said,  
22 there are additional rules that we are working on that we  
23 believe will need -- will need to be posted to deal with  
24 the changes from SB 202. We're also getting -- getting  
25 questions and comments from counties, other people, to

1 help deal with -- to help us see kind of what rules might  
2 be needed, and I'm happy to -- to take any questions from  
3 any Board members.

4 MS. SULLIVAN: Do any Board members have any  
5 questions for Mr. Germany? Thank you, Mr. Germany. I  
6 know that this represents a lot of staff work on the part  
7 of the Secretary of State's Office, as well as the Rules  
8 Working Group, and we appreciate your efforts in this  
9 regard. As stated before, all that is required of the  
10 Board at this point is a vote to post these rules for  
11 public comment. Unless any Board member objects, I will  
12 entertain a motion to post them as a bloc instead of  
13 voting on each rule individually at this time. Are there  
14 any objections to considering these rules as a bloc?

15 MR. MASHBURN: No objection.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Do we have a motion to post these  
17 rules for public comment? I'll go ahead and restate the  
18 rules: 183-1-12-.08, 183-1-12-.11, 183-1-12-.12, 183-1-12-  
19 .13, 183-1-12-.18, 183-1-14-.12, and 183-1-14-.14.

20 MR. MASHBURN: I move that the rules be posted as  
21 presented for public comment.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion to post the rules for  
23 public comment. Do we have a second?

24 MS. GHAZAL: Second.

25 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second. Is

1       there any further discussion? All in favor, please  
2       signify by saying aye.

3               THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

4               MS. SULLIVAN: Any opposed? None, and these rules  
5       will be posted for public comment. The next item on our  
6       agenda is appointment of a performance review panel. OCGA  
7       section 21-2-106 requires that upon the request of at  
8       least two members of the Georgia House of Representatives  
9       and two members of the Georgia Senate who represent a  
10      county that is represented in the General Assembly by more  
11      than three members of both the House and the Senate, the  
12      State Election Board shall appoint an independent  
13      performance review board within 30 days after receiving a  
14      request that a performance review of a local election  
15      official be conducted. That code section requires that  
16      the State Election Board appoint three competent persons  
17      to serve of members of the performance review board, one  
18      of whom shall be an employee of the Elections Division of  
19      the Secretary of State and two of whom shall be local  
20      election officials, provided that no such appointee shall  
21      be a local election official for the county or  
22      municipality of the applicable under review.

23              The law further provides that it shall be the duty of  
24      a performance review board to make a thorough and complete  
25      investigation of the local election official with respect

1 to all actions of the local election official regarding  
2 the technical competency and the maintenance and operation  
3 of election equipment, proper administration and oversight  
4 of registration and elections, and compliance with state  
5 law and regulations. The performance review board is  
6 required by law to issue a written report of its findings  
7 to the Secretary of State, the State Election Board, and  
8 the local governing authority, which shall include such  
9 evaluations, judgements, and recommendations it deems  
10 appropriate.

11 The State Election Board has received requests from a  
12 requisite number of members of the Georgia Senate and the  
13 Georgia House of Representatives that a performance review  
14 of Fulton County local elected officials be conducted  
15 pursuant to OCGA 21-2-106. Accordingly, this Board is  
16 required by law to appoint three persons to serve on a  
17 performance review board of Fulton County local elected  
18 officials. We have before us a bipartisan slate of  
19 candidates to consider for appointment for this purpose.  
20 The slate for consideration before us today is Stephen  
21 Day, who is a member of the Gwinnett County Board of  
22 Elections, Ricky Kittle, who currently serves as the Chair  
23 of the Catoosa County Board of Elections, and Ryan  
24 Germany, who is the General Counsel for the Sec -- Georgia  
25 Secretary of State.

1           At this time, I will entertain a motion to appoint  
2 this slate of individuals to serve on a performance review  
3 board of Fulton County local elected officials.

4           MR. MASHBURN: I move that the slate be adopted and  
5 accepted as presented.

6           MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion. Do we have a  
7 second?

8           MS. LE: I second it.

9           MS. SULLIVAN: At this time, it would be the  
10 appropriate time for any discussion by the Board members  
11 regarding this motion.

12          MS. GHAZAL: Chair Sullivan?

13          MS. SULLIVAN: Yes, please go ahead.

14          MS. GHAZAL: First, I'd like to reiterate as you  
15 stated that the State Election Board has no discretion  
16 with regards to this appointment, so we are mandated by  
17 law to -- to make this appointment. It is both my hope  
18 and expectation that the members of the review board who  
19 have been nominated today will take their jobs very  
20 seriously and will engage in the review with the singular  
21 goal in mind how best Fulton County's Election Board and  
22 staff can serve the voters of Fulton County. Any election  
23 office has two goals: to ensure that every eligible voter  
24 can access their ballot and cast it by the method of their  
25 choosing and that those ballots are counted accurately and

1 transparently in such a way that it assures the public  
2 that they can have trust in the outcome.

3 I also understand that the performance review board  
4 is going to be under tremendous political pressure on both  
5 sides to come to preordained conclusions, but I -- knowing  
6 the members of this Board, I trust that they'll resist the  
7 pressure and approach their task with an open mind. The  
8 narrative driving this pressure has been influenced by  
9 disinformation surrounding the November 2020 election, but  
10 the fact remains that Fulton County voters have reported  
11 numerous problems for far longer than November 2020,  
12 particularly surrounding registration and absentee  
13 ballots, so I -- I urge Fulton County to review this  
14 performance review board as an opportunity to have fresh  
15 eyes on their systems and their procedures and identify  
16 areas of improvement. I understand that the County is in  
17 the process of hiring external consultants to review the  
18 County's operations. I hope that the review board will be  
19 able to work together with these consultants to ensure  
20 that eligible voters of Fulton County receive the service  
21 and the elections that they deserve.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Ghazal. Mr. Mashburn,  
23 would you like to make any comments?

24 MR. MASHBURN: Just a few observations about the  
25 slate of candidates, that I think the slate of candidates

1 does a very good job of balancing large metropolitan areas  
2 and counties with a more rural area, balances  
3 bipartisanship, has a Republican and a Democrat, and, of  
4 course, has Ryan Germany, whose skill as a lawyer,  
5 knowledge of election law, and demeanor as a person are --  
6 are unmatched, so I think, you know, we've got a great  
7 slate of candidates here that have been carefully balanced  
8 to reflect all -- all interests so that the accusations  
9 that we've heard in the past that this is just a  
10 Republican hatchet job against Fulton County is just not -  
11 - just not reflected by this slate of candidates. I just  
12 wanted to also compliment these individuals for their  
13 willingness to serve. They're all very experienced in  
14 this, so they know that this is a -- a largely thankless  
15 task except for the voters who are benefited on Election  
16 Day when these problems are resolved.

17 And I would -- I would join in Sara's comment that  
18 this is an invitation to Fulton that it would be very nice  
19 for the Board to able to report when their report comes  
20 out that -- that this was a problem but in the meantime,  
21 we've -- we've seen this be cured and this be fixed, so  
22 that would -- that would be a great part of the report.  
23 So I encourage Fulton to just -- to keep trying to improve  
24 and not just throw up their hands and say well, it's all  
25 in the hands of the Board now.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Mr. Mashburn. Any  
2 additional comments? Would any of the Board members like  
3 to make a motion to appoint this slate of individuals to  
4 serve on a performance review board of Fulton County  
5 elected officials at this time?

6 MR. MASHBURN: I think it's made, with a second.

7 MS. SULLIVAN: Oh, we did. That's right. Thank you,  
8 Mr. Mashburn. That was a little while ago. We have a --  
9 we have a motion and a second. All in favor, please vote  
10 -- signify by saying aye.

11 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

12 MS. SULLIVAN: Any opposed? Then that motion passes.  
13 Thank you. We're going to move onto the investigation  
14 report, so first block of cases on our agenda are the  
15 consent cases. There are two cases on the agenda that  
16 have been continued. That is SEB case number 2020-148,  
17 Greene County and SEB case number 2020-256, Fulton County.  
18 Are there any cases on this list that any of the Board  
19 members would like to pull off for separate discussion?

20 MR. MASHBURN: I do not have any that I would like to  
21 have pulled out.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: It looks like we -- none of the Board  
23 members want to pull off any of these cases. Do we have  
24 any complainants or Respondents that are on this call that  
25 would like to speak to any of these individual cases?

1 MS. THOMAS: No. We do not have any for these ones.

2 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. At this time, I will entertain  
3 a motion.

4 MS. THOMAS: We had someone raise their hand.

5 MS. SULLIVAN: Oh. Just a moment.

6 MS. THOMAS: All right. Denise Muehr? You may --

7 MS. MUEHR: Yes.

8 MS. THOMAS: -- speak now.

9 MS. MUEHR: Yes.

10 MS. THOMAS: Just wondering which case you're here  
11 for?

12 MS. MUEHR: It's 2020-000157, but I'm not seeing it  
13 on this slate of numbers. Will it be coming up at a later  
14 time?

15 MS. THOMAS: Yes. We're just discussing these  
16 consent cases right now.

17 MS. MUEHR: Okay. I apologize. I will stand back.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: Not a problem.

19 MS. MUEHR: Thank you.

20 MS. THOMAS: Jamida Orange? You may unmute yourself.

21 MS. ORANGE: Jamida, I'm just here to listen.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you. Okay. We will go  
23 ahead and vote to dismiss the consent cases as a bloc,  
24 pulling out, of course, those two cases that were  
25 continued. Now would be the appropriate time for a

1 motion.

2 MR. MASHBURN: I move that those cases be processed  
3 in accordance with the matters that have been presented.

4 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion. Is there a second?

5 MS. LE: I second.

6 MS. SULLIVAN: Any further discussion? All in favor,  
7 please signify by saying aye.

8 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

9 MS. SULLIVAN: And there are none opposed, and those  
10 cases will be dismissed. The next cases are -- set of  
11 cases are letter cases. Do any of the Board members want  
12 to pull off any of these cases for separate discussion or  
13 consideration?

14 MR. MASHBURN: I do not, Matt Mashburn.

15 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Do we have any individuals on  
16 the call who would like to speak to one of these cases,  
17 either a complainant or a Respondent?

18 MS. THOMAS: We do have Ezek -- Ezell Brown and  
19 Sergeant Victoria Hammond and Attorney William Craig, and  
20 Mr. Ezell Brown is the Sheriff of Newton County. They are  
21 on the call to speak towards this case.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: That's case 2020-114?

23 MS. THOMAS: Yes. 2020-114 for Newton County. Mr.  
24 Ezell, I did see you when you signed up, but I don't see  
25 your name now. If you could raise your hand, so I could

1 see which account you're logged under. All right. You  
2 may unmute yourself now.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: Well, let's -- are there any other  
4 cases right now that we have members to speak to --  
5 individuals to speak to?

6 MR. TOLLEY: Okay. Can you hear me, Chairman  
7 Sullivan?

8 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes, we can hear you.

9 MR. TOLLEY: All right. My name is Edward Tolley.  
10 I'm a lawyer in Athens, Georgia, and I represent Sheriff  
11 Ezell Brown in this complaint of illegal campaigning,  
12 which he --

13 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Just a moment, Mr. Tolley. I  
14 think I'll ask Ms. Watson to go ahead and give us an  
15 overview of this case if we're pulling it off for  
16 discussion and then give you an opportunity to speak.

17 MR. TOLLEY: All right, ma'am.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. This is SEB case number  
19 2020-114?

20 MS. WATSON: Yes. A complaint regarding illegal  
21 campaigning during the Newton County 2020 general election  
22 was reported. According to the complaint, Sheriff Ezell  
23 Brown was campaigning outside the Newton County  
24 administrative building, which served as a polling  
25 precinct during the early voting period. He was seen

1 speaking with voters in line in a mobile campaign  
2 billboard endorsing Brown circling the voting precinct.  
3 Investigation revealed the complainant provided pictures  
4 and videos of the mobile billboard. A follow-up interview  
5 revealed that Newton County Coroner Tommy Davis was also  
6 seen campaigning outside the precinct.

7           Investigators interviewed Sheriff Brown, and he  
8 stated he was present outside the Newton County  
9 administrative building, but he denied he was campaigning.  
10 He stated he was there to assess the situation of long  
11 lines and to respond to a medical emergency. However,  
12 there were several sheriff deputies assigned to the  
13 polling precinct, and there were no dispatch calls for  
14 service at the administrative building on that date. The  
15 election supervisor informed Sheriff Brown that he could  
16 not be present at the polling precinct, and he agreed to  
17 leave. However, he returned to the precinct a few days  
18 later to provide the election supervisor with a copy of  
19 OCGA 15-16-10, which he believed authorized him to be  
20 present at any polling precinct. He was in uniform when  
21 he entered the polling precinct. There were voters  
22 present, and he was not there to cast his ballot.

23           Regarding the mobile billboard, Sheriff Brown stated  
24 the mobile billboard was donated to his campaign, and he  
25 did not instruct the driver of any particular route.

1       Investigators interviewed the driver of the mobile  
2       billboard, David Allen [ph.]. He confirmed he drove the  
3       mobile billboard past the polling precinct, stated he was  
4       not familiar with the area, and he was not aware that he  
5       could not drive past the polling precinct and stated he  
6       was not instructed by anyone to drive a particular route.

7               Investigators interviewed Newton County Coroner Tommy  
8       Davis. He admitted to driving past the polling precinct  
9       in his personal vehicle that had had a campaign sign  
10      mounted on it. However, he stated he was just on his way  
11      to get breakfast and driving past the administrative  
12      building was the most direct route to the restaurant.

13             Our recommendation is for all Respondents to be  
14      issued a letter of instruction and any future violations  
15      to be referred to the Attorney General.

16             MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Watson. Go ahead, Mr.  
17      Tolley.

18             MR. TOLLEY: Yes, ma'am. On Friday, I prepared a  
19      motion to dismiss this allegation against Sheriff Brown.  
20      I served the counsel, Mr. Germany, to the Secretary of  
21      State. We dispute factually what's just been said, and  
22      I'll address that in a minute, but I want to address the  
23      motion to dismiss, which is in writing and filed with the  
24      State Election Board, first. And first of all, the  
25      dispute here in a nutshell involves whether or not Title

1 21-2-41(4)(b) overrules in effect Title 15-16-10(a)(3)(8),  
2 and stated very simply, if a constitutional officer, which  
3 he is -- and the brief sets out the case law that supports  
4 that -- he has a duty, which is a command statement, to  
5 attend on any election precincts. It's not an option for  
6 him to not attend. He can attend by appointing people,  
7 but he himself must perform the duties imposed by law  
8 which appertain to his office.

9 This -- as we understand it, the two people who had  
10 campaign signs that drove by did not do so at the  
11 direction of the sheriff. I believe that's a finding.  
12 And they are really -- whatever -- whatever the Board does  
13 about them, the Board just does, but in -- in terms of the  
14 sheriff being at the precinct in uniform, that is his job.

15 And I have gone on to argue in my brief why this  
16 should be dismissed. In a nutshell, Title 15 says -- let  
17 me get the book out. I wish I could see the Board and  
18 show the Board what I'm looking at, but Title 15-16-10,  
19 subsection 3, says it is the duty of the sheriff to attend  
20 in the same manner specified -- that same matter is upon  
21 all sessions -- both this subsection -- at the place or  
22 places of holding an election at the county site on the  
23 date of an election from the opening to the closing of the  
24 polls and to take under his charge all subordinate  
25 officers present as the police to preserve order. In

1 addition, paragraph 8 of that subsection says he is to  
2 perform such other duties as are or may be imposed by law.  
3 It is actually a misdemeanor for the sheriff to refuse or  
4 fail to attend the polls.

5 Now, I agree that there is a conflict between Title  
6 15 and Title 21 on campaign activity, but as I've argued  
7 in this brief, if the legislature had intended to prevent  
8 a sheriff who is also a candidate from attending a polling  
9 location -- the legislature could have easily done so. I  
10 made a citation to a couple of Georgia cases. So you've  
11 got a conflict in the statutes. The sheriff is mandated  
12 to go into the polling places. If he doesn't go, he  
13 violates his duty, and it's actually a misdemeanor. But  
14 if he does go, according to the investigator and according  
15 to the election supervisor, then he has violated Title 21.  
16 The two cannot be reconciled.

17 It is not -- it is not up to -- it's not up to the  
18 State Election Board to decide that they would apply one  
19 statute over the other because Title 15, which governs the  
20 duties of the sheriff in an election, -- Title 15 is a  
21 specific statute that I would argue, and I believe is the  
22 law, that overrules the general election statute. As I  
23 said, the legislature can change this. They could have  
24 changed it. They could have said otherwise. But I think  
25 this Board should be aware that this statute essentially

1 has been around since the 1800s without change. 1799 was  
2 actually the date it was enacted the first time, and it's  
3 never been a controversy before.

4 Now, -- so our motion is to just simply dismiss this  
5 allegation against the sheriff. We do have three  
6 witnesses here to contest the allegations in the report if  
7 the Board wishes to go forward and hear from them, but  
8 it's my motion right now, at this level, that this  
9 allegation against Sheriff Brown, who is a four-term  
10 Sheriff for Newton County -- he's a gubernational  
11 appointee to important boards for the State of Georgia.  
12 This is very important to him, and I move that this be  
13 dismissed.

14 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Mr. Tolley. Do any of the  
15 Board members have questions for Mr. Tolley? Mr.  
16 Mashburn?

17 MR. MASHBURN: Well, I think that presentation was  
18 excellent. Georgia has a unique history, and it was one  
19 of the purposes that the voter protection bubble was  
20 installed, that in the past there were many incidences  
21 where people waiting in line were pulled out of line and  
22 intimidated and beaten, and it was almost always the  
23 sheriff. Now, there's no allegation that this sheriff has  
24 done anything other than campaign, but that's where the  
25 voter protection bubble came from, and I'd always puzzled

1 myself -- or pondered myself why was it always the  
2 sheriffs that were doing it? And so I think the statute  
3 might provide the answer for that. I've also been a poll  
4 watcher for many, many years, and I know exactly where the  
5 hundred-and-fifty-foot barrier is, and I -- based on my  
6 personal experience, I feel that the sheriff can fulfill  
7 his duties under Chapter 15 -- Title 15 from a hundred and  
8 fifty foot away, and if anything needs to be handled  
9 closer in, he can send a deputy. The sheriff could send  
10 in a deputy. So I move that the motion to dismiss not be  
11 accepted and couple that motion with a motion that the  
12 letter of instruction be issued as presented.

13 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. We have a motion on the table.  
14 Is there a second?

15 MS. LE: This is Anh Le. I have a comment as well  
16 before I second this motion. 21-2-4-14, section d, is  
17 universal. Aside from Mr. Mashburn's concern, which is  
18 well taken as well, it is universal to all candidates, and  
19 it's -- it's intended also to create a level playing field  
20 for candidates and voters alike to have elections free of  
21 -- of intimidation or influence as voters go to cast their  
22 votes, so I stand firm with the motion on the table, but  
23 also I would also like to ask whether or not there was a  
24 deputy available to Mr. Brown on the day of, subject to  
25 15-16-10 (2) -- (8)(2). Subsection (8)(2) says that the

1 sheriff or his deputies could attend, so did he have a  
2 deputy available that day?

3 MR. TOLLEY: Are we unmuted? Can you hear me, Chair  
4 Sullivan?

5 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes. Yes. Go ahead. Yes. Go ahead,  
6 Mr. Tolley.

7 MR. TOLLEY: All right. If you please, I have three  
8 witnesses to address the issue at hand. Obviously,  
9 there's no allegation -- I mean, all we have to go on is a  
10 specific allegation against this sheriff, and the specific  
11 allegation in the notice of hearing, which is a due  
12 process matter, is that when he -- when he entered the  
13 polling precinct to speak with the election supervisor  
14 regarding the allegations against him. So that is the  
15 notice that we received of a violation, and that's what  
16 we're defending. But having said that, I do have a  
17 sergeant here that called the sheriff due to the illness  
18 of a -- of a person. I do have the sheriff here who  
19 wishes to speak, and I do have the former county attorney  
20 who has advised the sheriff and all the other sheriffs  
21 that have ever served in this county that this -- that the  
22 sheriff must attend, and his attendance is lawful, and  
23 this statute does not limit the sheriff to a hundred and  
24 fifty feet.

25 I understand what Mr. Mashburn was saying. I'm in

1 sympathy with his interpretation, but that is not in the  
2 law, and that's all we can go on is what the statute says.  
3 So if the Chair wishes, I am prepared to put up these  
4 witnesses.

5 MS. SULLIVAN: If the sheriff would like to speak,  
6 the Board is happy to hear from him.

7 MR. TOLLEY: All right. Well, may I start then with  
8 Sergeant Victoria Hammond, who -- there were -- there were  
9 seven polling places in Newton County. Seven. This  
10 allegation only involves one polling place, and it  
11 involves the sheriff going to that polling place for a  
12 specific reason, so with your permission, I will swear in  
13 Sergeant Hammond, and then I will ask her to make a  
14 statement to the Chair. Is that all right, Chairman  
15 Sullivan?

16 MS. SULLIVAN: I -- I don't -- I don't think that is  
17 necessary at this point, Mr. Tolley. I mean, this is --  
18 this case, the recommendation and the motion that is on  
19 the table is to dismiss this case with a letter of  
20 instruction. There is no need to have witness testimony  
21 at this point. Yes, Ms. Le, did you want to be  
22 recognized?

23 MS. LE: Yes. I think there is a motion on the table  
24 to accept by Mr. Mashburn. I was thinking of seconding  
25 it, but I would like to make a new motion, Mr. Mashburn,

1 if that would be all right with you, seeing that this is a  
2 contested issue. I would like to move that we send this  
3 to the Attorney General's Office for review.

4 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Well, we have a motion on the  
5 table right now to issue a letter of instruction, so I  
6 don't think we can consider a motion at this point unless  
7 Mr. Mashburn wanted to withdraw that motion.

8 MR. MASHBURN: I'll withdraw my motion and allow Anh  
9 Le's motion to take precedence over my motion and then  
10 second Anh Le's motion.

11 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. So we have a motion and a  
12 second to go ahead -- and is this to refer all three  
13 Respondents to the Attorney General's Office or just the -  
14 - Sheriff Brown?

15 MR. MASHBURN: Just Sheriff Brown, right?

16 MS. LE: Just Sheriff Brown, please.

17 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. So the motion on the table that  
18 has been seconded is to refer the allegations regarding  
19 Sheriff Brown to the Attorney General's Office. At that  
20 point, Mr. Tolley, you will be able to swear in witnesses  
21 and continue your argument at that point before the  
22 Attorney General's Office in the formal hearing should  
23 your client so wish. So we have a motion and a second on  
24 the table. Is there any further discussion? All in favor  
25 of the motion, please signify by saying aye.

1 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

2 MS. SULLIVAN: And there are none opposed, so that  
3 motion passes. We do have two additional Respondents in  
4 this case, and the recommendation is to issue a letter of  
5 instruction to those two Respondents. Do we have a motion  
6 to proceed with that?

7 MR. MASHBURN: I move that we proceed with a letter  
8 of instruction in both cases.

9 MS. SULLIVAN: Is there a second?

10 MS. LE: I'll second it.

11 MS. SULLIVAN: Any further discussion? All in favor,  
12 please signify by saying aye.

13 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

14 MS. SULLIVAN: And there are none opposed so that  
15 concludes our discussion of 2020-114. We are going to  
16 pull off SEB case number 2020-139 for discussion per the  
17 request of Board Member Ghazal. Ms. Watson, would you  
18 mind giving us an overview and quick summary of that case?  
19 139, yes. That's DeKalb County.

20 MS. WATSON: Yes. A complaint alleging that Dunwoody  
21 Library advance polling location in DeKalb County had an  
22 unsecured absentee ballot drop box was reported in October  
23 of 2020. Investigation showed the complainant reported a  
24 poll worker at the poll location was able to access the  
25 inside of the ballot box which did appear to be -- did not

1 appear to be secured. The poll manager advised that she  
2 initially directed voters wanting to drop off absentee  
3 ballots to the official drop box located at Dunwoody City  
4 Hall. She advised after she was given direction from the  
5 director, Erica Hamilton, that she could accept absentee  
6 ballots at the polls, she began accepting the ballots, and  
7 they were placed in the box labeled ballot box that was in  
8 public view and was always being patrolled by herself or  
9 one of the other poll managers.

10 An investigator observed the box that was secured  
11 with a zip tie. The opening at the top was too small for  
12 the absentee ballot envelopes to fit in, so the top of the  
13 box had to be raised for the absentee envelopes to be  
14 inserted. The box was secured at night according to the  
15 manager in a location that only she had access to. The  
16 plan was to empty the box at the end of early voting and  
17 put in a transfer form and deliver the absentee ballots to  
18 the main office. After discussion, the poll manager  
19 advised she would arrange the absentee ballots that she  
20 had received to be delivered to the main office and would  
21 not accept any further absentee ballots in this method.

22 Investigation revealed that the poll manager of the  
23 Dunwoody Library advance voting location was properly  
24 deputized as a registrar to legally accept absentee  
25 ballots and had accepted absentee ballots only for several

1 days during the advance voting period. As set forth in  
2 the Georgia voting rules, the makeshift drop box at the  
3 Dunwoody library did not use the continuous reporting or  
4 motion-detected video recording device to monitor the drop  
5 box, was not constructed of material -- durable materials,  
6 and was not able to withstand elements and weather. The  
7 opening slot did not minimize the ability for looking in,  
8 and it was not securely fastened to the ground or to an  
9 immovable fixture.

10 They did not stop using the box immediately -- I'm  
11 sorry. They did stop using the box immediately upon  
12 notification regarding the complaint. There were -- the  
13 absentee ballots that had been collected were immediately  
14 transferred and were processed at that time. Our  
15 recommendation is for Erica Hamilton and for the DeKalb  
16 County Board of Election and Registration be issued a  
17 letter of instruction -- instruction, as the absentee  
18 ballots that were collected during the short time they  
19 utilized the box were transferred to the main office, and  
20 the box removed under Georgia State Election Board rule  
21 183-1-14-.06-.14, 1 through 9, secure absentee ballot drop  
22 boxes.

23 MS. THOMAS: Irene Vander Els is on the line.

24 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay.

25 MS. LE: Ms. Sullivan, this is Anh Le. I -- just

1 before you continue further, I'd like to recuse myself  
2 from this case, please.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. That's -- so noted that Ms. Le  
4 has recused herself from this case. I believe -- thank  
5 you, Ms. Watson. I believe we have someone from DeKalb  
6 County on the line that would like to address this case.

7 MS. VANDER ELS: Yes. This is Irene Vander Els. I  
8 represent the DeKalb County Board of Registration and  
9 Elections and our Director, Erica Hamilton, and I'd just  
10 like to ask the Board to continue this matter because we  
11 did not receive notice of the matter and that it would be  
12 heard at the meeting today, and so I'd just like an  
13 opportunity to investigate the allegations with my client  
14 and prepare a response before the Board considers the  
15 matter.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. If you did not receive notice,  
17 we will go ahead and continue this case for the next  
18 meeting.

19 MS. VANDER ELS: Thank you.

20 MR. MASHBURN: No objection.

21 MS. SULLIVAN: Is there any objection by any of the  
22 Board members? Ms. Ghazal, do you have any objections?

23 MS. GHAZAL: No, I have no objection to continuing  
24 this.

25 MS. SULLIVAN: Do we have any Respondents here to

1 speak to any of the remaining letter cases?

2 MS. THOMAS: Yes. For case number 2020-291, Stuart  
3 County, the Elections Supervisor Alfreda Hudson is on the  
4 line.

5 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Ms. Hudson, would you like to  
6 speak to this case?

7 MS. HUDSON: Yes. Can you hear me?

8 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. If you'd like to speak, I'm  
9 going to have Ms. Watson to give us a summary of the case  
10 first. Go ahead, Ms. Watson.

11 MS. WATSON: On December 31st, 2020, investigation  
12 was forwarded a complaint alleging elector Walter Morrogh  
13 [ph.] photographed his ballot while inside the polling  
14 place. Mr. Morrogh admitted photographing his ballot and  
15 further explained he was unaware this was a violation of  
16 state election code. Investigators forwarded Mr. Morrogh  
17 OCGA 21-2-413(e) via email at his request. Recommendation  
18 is for Mr. Morrogh to be issued a letter of instruction  
19 for violation of 21-2-413(e).

20 MS. SULLIVAN: Go ahead, Ms. Hudson.

21 MS. HUDSON: Can you hear me?

22 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes, ma'am.

23 MS. HUDSON: Okay. On that date, the poll worker  
24 that was -- that allegedly saw Mr. Morrogh do that, I  
25 didn't get that information until after he had left. I'm

1 not sure what I was -- you know, was told to do after  
2 that. I just wanted to report it. I haven't had any  
3 contact with Mr. Morrogh following that alleged incident,  
4 so that's pretty much where we are right now.

5 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you. Is Mr. Murdoch on  
6 the line? Okay. So we have case number 2020-291 before  
7 us. The recommendation is to issue -- issue a letter of  
8 instruction to Mr. Morrogh. Do we have a motion?

9 MR. MASHBURN: So move.

10 MS. SULLIVAN: And a second?

11 MS. LE: I'll second it.

12 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second. Is  
13 there any further discussion? All in favor, please say  
14 aye.

15 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Any opposed? A letter of instruction  
17 will be issued in that case. Do we have any other cases,  
18 letter cases -- no one else to speak to any of the letter  
19 cases. So the remaining three cases where the  
20 recommendation is to issue a letter of instruction, we can  
21 go ahead and vote on en bloc. Those are SEB case number  
22 2020-098, 2020-268, and 2020-284. The recommendation is  
23 to issue a letter of instruction in those cases. Is there  
24 a motion?

25 MR. MASHBURN: So move.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion. Is there a second?

2 MS. LE: Second.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: Any further discussion? All in favor,  
4 please say aye.

5 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

6 MS. SULLIVAN: Are there any -- and then that would  
7 be none opposed. Those cases, a letter of instruction  
8 would be issued. Let's take a five-minute break before we  
9 get to the new cases. I have 2:02. We'll back -- oops.  
10 10:02. Let's say we'll be back at 10:10. Thank you.

11 (Meeting break)

12 (Meeting resumes)

13 MS. SULLIVAN: We're going to pick up with SEB case  
14 number 2019-002, Fulton County. Ms. Watson, if you would  
15 go ahead and give us the summary of the case.

16 MS. WATSON: Yes. Between November 7th, 2018 to  
17 December 21st, 2018, we received multiple complaints  
18 regarding the processing of absentee ballot applications  
19 by Fulton County Registration and Election division.  
20 According to the complaints, voters did not receive their  
21 absentee ballots in a timely manner, or they did not  
22 receive their ballots at all. Investigation revealed in  
23 seven complaints from Fulton County registered voters  
24 regarding untimely processing of absentee ballot  
25 applications, each voter either did not receive the ballot

1 on time, or they did not receive the ballot at all for the  
2 November 2018 general election.

3 Between May 2019 to June 2020 -- 2020, the Georgia  
4 Office of the Secretary of State made multiple requests  
5 for documentation to the Fulton County Registration and  
6 Election Office, the purpose of the request: to review  
7 voter absentee ballot documentation in order to  
8 investigation the allegations. Despite email, telephone,  
9 and Open Records requests, the Fulton County Registration  
10 and Election Office failed to provide the request for  
11 records. On October 22nd, 2020, Election Supervisor  
12 Richard Barron was served with a subpoena via email to  
13 provide access to the above-mentioned records. He  
14 confirmed receipt of the subpoena and indicated he would  
15 work with his staff to schedule an appointment to review  
16 the records after the 2020 general election.

17 On March 30th, 2021, Elections Chief Nadine Williams  
18 advised that her office lost track of the request, and the  
19 records in question were destroyed in January of 2021. As  
20 a result, the Office of the Secretary of State  
21 Investigations Division could not investigate the  
22 allegations. Our recommendation is Fulton County Board of  
23 Election and Registration be bound over to the Attorney  
24 General's Office for violation of 21-2-562(b), neglect or  
25 refusal to deliver documents.

1 MS. THOMAS: And David Lowman and Shamira Marshall  
2 are on the line for Fulton County.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Mr. Lowman, please go ahead.

4 MR. LOWMAN: Yes. This is David Lowman for the  
5 Fulton County attorney's office. Can you hear me?

6 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes, we can. Please go ahead.

7 MR. LOWMAN: All right. Yes. With regard to the  
8 subpoena, it is unfortunate that it got passed on and then  
9 got either misplaced or somehow didn't make it where it  
10 was supposed to. Unfortunately, as your investigative  
11 report states, this was during a COVID outbreak, and  
12 because of the amount of time that passed between the  
13 initial request and the actual follow-up, the records have  
14 been destroyed lawfully, pursuant to 21-2-386. With  
15 regard to any of the requests that came through via Open  
16 Records because that is controlled by the Open Records  
17 Act, I would ask that that be handled that way, and with  
18 respect to any of the other -- I guess it was seven  
19 applications -- I would ask for a letter of instruction in  
20 this case.

21 MS. SULLIVAN: Can you restate your -- with regards  
22 to -- a letter of instruction be issued with regards  
23 to...?

24 MR. LOWMAN: I believe it was seven allegations.

25 MS. SULLIVAN: All right. Do any of the Board

1 members have any questions for Mr. Lowman?

2 MR. MASHBURN: I do not.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: Mr. Lowman, do you have anyone else  
4 with you who would like to speak to the allegations in  
5 this case?

6 MR. LOWMAN: Not on this -- not on this matter,  
7 ma'am.

8 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Would any of the Board members  
9 like to make a motion?

10 MR. MASHBURN: This is Matt Mashburn. I make a  
11 motion that it be bound over to the Attorney General's  
12 Office for processing as recommended, that we adopt the  
13 recommendation of the investigators.

14 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. We have a motion to bind this  
15 matter over to the Attorney General's Office. Is there a  
16 second?

17 MS. LE: I second it.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: A motion and a second. Is there any  
19 further discussion? All in favor of the motion, please  
20 signify by saying aye.

21 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: And that's none opposed. Thank you,  
23 Mr. Lowman, for being here. The next case on the agenda  
24 is SEB case number 2019-018, Wilkes County. Is there  
25 anyone here to speak to that? Okay, good. Ms. Watson, if

1 you would go ahead and do your presentation.

2 MS. WATSON: On June 20th of 2019, a complainant  
3 reported that Wilkes County voter registration office had  
4 been closed during regular business hours at different  
5 times over the voting period. This case was previously  
6 presented and referred back to investigations as Judge  
7 Charping advised the Board that he had documentation of  
8 the former registrar not performing his duties. The  
9 original allegation presented was that Wilkes County  
10 failed to have the registrar's office open due to staffing  
11 issues. The issue [sound distortion] from one staff  
12 member resigning and another staff member having to leave  
13 due to medical reasons. The absences resulted in  
14 approximately 76 hours in which the office was closed.

15 Judge Charping was contacted and provided  
16 documentation dating back to 2016 regarding the issues he  
17 reported regarding the performance of the registrar. The  
18 primary documentation related to screenshots of the county  
19 dashboard for the Department of Driver Service voter  
20 registrations and transfers. The pending list contained  
21 six to nine hundred pending applications and transfers  
22 from June through August of 2019 with many showing two  
23 months over ten months to process. A petition for removal  
24 of the chief registrar was filed in the Wilkes County  
25 Superior Court in 2019 finding failure to train, failure

1 to timely conduct the business of the voter registrar or  
2 to include the processing of voter registrations and  
3 processing ballots, and failure to effectively work with  
4 the elections superintendent. The settlement agreement  
5 with reached in August of 2019 with the retirement of the  
6 chief registrar.

7 Our recommendation is for Wilkes County Board of  
8 Registrars be issued a letter of instruction for the  
9 original complaint of violation of 21-2-215(c) and that  
10 the previous chief registrar Debbie Anderson be referred  
11 to the AG's Office for violation of 21-2-592.

12 MS. SULLIVAN: I believe that we have someone on the  
13 line from Wilkes County to address this case.

14 MS. THOMAS: Yes. Gyvonne Pinkston?

15 MS. SULLIVAN: Ms. Pinkston?

16 MS. THOMAS: You may speak now.

17 MR. LEGETTE: Can you hear us?

18 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes. Go ahead.

19 MR. LEGETTE: Hello?

20 MS. THOMAS: Yes. We can hear you. We can hear you.

21 MR. LEGETTE: Very good. This is Charles LeGette.  
22 [ph.]. I'm the county attorney here in Wilkes County.  
23 I'm here on behalf of the Board of Registrars. I've got a  
24 couple of Board members here with me today, but I -- I  
25 guess if it's appropriate, I'd like to make a statement

1 about where we are in the process, if I may?

2 MS. SULLIVAN: Please, go ahead.

3 MR. LEGETTE: All right. Very good. The problems  
4 that were uncovered in your investigation have been dealt  
5 with. With Ms. Anderson's retirement, we brought in a new  
6 Board. We've processed all the backlog. Our new Board  
7 got us through the last election. We corrected the  
8 problems. For example, the office being closed part time,  
9 we have corrected that. We've solved those problems.  
10 We've got a good functioning Board now. I guess, that's  
11 the bottom line from the -- I represent County government  
12 here, and we feel like we've got a good Board. We're  
13 moving forward. The problems are corrected, and, you  
14 know, in our view, what happened during Ms. Anderson's  
15 time is basically water over the dam.

16 I sure don't want to have y'all romping on my present  
17 Board, who's doing a great job. No offense to anyone. My  
18 present Board is doing a good job, and they've corrected  
19 those problems, so we're trying to move forward, and so,  
20 you know, my -- I guess, my fear or my concern as the  
21 county attorney, if y'all feel like you need to lay the  
22 wood to our present Board, those people weren't here  
23 during that time by and large, with one exception, and  
24 they've moved on, and they're doing a great job. So  
25 whatever we can do to wrap this up, we're interested.

1 That's kind of where we stand today.

2 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Mr. LeGette. I believe  
3 that the recommendation is with regards to the Board is  
4 actually just to issue a letter of instruction.

5 MR. LEGETTE: Are there any questions y'all have got  
6 of me or my present Board members?

7 MS. SULLIVAN: Do any of the Board members have any  
8 questions for Mr. LeGette?

9 MR. MASHBURN: I don't have any questions, but just  
10 to satisfy your new Board members -- satisfy your new  
11 Board members, I will commend them for their efforts at  
12 remedial actions, and we always want to encourage that,  
13 and so you can tell them that the Board went on the record  
14 to -- to encourage them to continue to do better, and so I  
15 make a motion that we issue a letter of instruction  
16 because a past violation does appear to have occurred, and  
17 so the proper way to close it is to issue a letter of  
18 instruction, so that's -- that's the reason I make that  
19 motion.

20 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you.

21 MR. MASHBURN: Oh, and to refer the former Board --  
22 Registrar Debbie Anderson to the AG's Office for  
23 processing.

24 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. We have a motion on the table.  
25 Is there a second?

1 MS. GHAZAL: Second.

2 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second. Before  
3 we move, I'm going to make sure there's no one else on the  
4 call that wanted to speak regarding this case. There's  
5 not. Okay. Any further discussion? All in favor of Mr.  
6 Mashburn's motion, please signify by saying aye.

7 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

8 MS. SULLIVAN: And there's none opposed. Thank you,  
9 Ms. LeGette and the Board members, for being here. The  
10 next case is SEB case number 2019-037, City of Glennville.

11 MS. WATSON: During the City of Glennville November  
12 5th, 2019 general election, a complainant alleged  
13 candidate Dorothy Berry entered a polling location while  
14 people were voting, transported a voter to the polls, and  
15 entered the voting area with the voter. The complainant  
16 also alleged the voter solicited money in exchange for  
17 voting. Investigation revealed Dorothy Berry transported  
18 voter Glenda Grimes [ph.] to the East Glennville precinct  
19 number 7 polling location during the advance voting period  
20 of the November 5th, 2019 general election. It also  
21 showed that Ms. Berry remained inside the polling location  
22 while Ms. Grimes completed the voting process. The  
23 complainant reported candidate Berry was hovering around  
24 the voting machine. The voter was assisted by someone  
25 other than Ms. Berry.

1 Ms. Berry confirmed that she did transport Ms. Grimes  
2 to the polling location and did walk her inside, but it  
3 was simply to show Ms. Grimes where to go. Ms. Berry said  
4 Ms. Grimes was confused and did not know where to go. Ms.  
5 Berry states Ms. Grimes did not solicit money in exchange  
6 for voting. Ms. Grimes says she voted on her own  
7 unassisted and did not solicit money or receive anything  
8 in exchange for voting. Ms. Grimes said Dorothy Berry  
9 remained inside and stood by the door greeting people as  
10 they entered. Investigation did not produce any evidence  
11 to show that Dorothy Berry submitted an absentee ballot  
12 for her daughter. Recommendation is for Dorothy Berry to  
13 be bound over to the Attorney General's Office for  
14 violation of 21-2-414(d).

15 MS. SULLIVAN: It's my understanding that we do not  
16 have anyone on the call who --

17 MS. THOMAS: Dorothy Berry just raised her hand.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: Oh, I'm sorry. Ms. Berry, please go  
19 ahead and address the Board if you would like to.

20 MS. BERRY: Hello. Good morning, everyone. I  
21 listened to the statement. I don't know -- my statement  
22 is accurate. I did not go inside the polling booth. I  
23 showed her to the door, as I said, because Ms. Grimes had  
24 never voted before, and she didn't know where to go vote,  
25 or she said she didn't know where to go to vote. I found

1 her walking to the polls. She stopped me, asked me to  
2 take her to the polls. I did so, which I didn't think was  
3 a violation, and I still don't think unless you tell me  
4 something different that that is a violation. I asked the  
5 young lady at the door to take her in there, show her the  
6 booth, and if she could not read, if she could help her,  
7 and I left, went back outside to my car, and was speaking  
8 with a voter that I knew that was getting ready to go in.  
9 I asked her to help her if she saw her in there. Now, why  
10 Ms. Grimes say I went inside and lingered around -- I  
11 don't believe she said that. If she did, it's untrue.

12 My integrity stands. I do not violate -- I do not  
13 tell anybody how to vote. I -- my opponent throughout the  
14 whole process was very ugly, very dirty. They were very  
15 visible on Facebook and everything else trying to tear my  
16 character down. No. I did not do any of that, and I do  
17 not feel like this should go any further. He won the  
18 election unfairly. I did not fight it. I had many  
19 complaints from many people who told me to contest it. I  
20 did not, and because I did not want to have all that stink  
21 and all those problems, so where they get all this from, I  
22 don't know. If you want to send it over to the Attorney  
23 General, fine. There's nothing I can do about it, but all  
24 those statements are untrue. I just wanted to go on  
25 record to say that I did not commit a crime.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Berry. Your comments  
2 have been noted. Do any of the Board members have any  
3 questions?

4 MR. MASHBURN: I just have one question for Ms.  
5 Berry. This is Matt Mashburn. Ms. Berry?

6 MS. BERRY: Yes?

7 MR. MASHBURN: How far away -- how far away from the  
8 door of the polling place do you think your car was  
9 parked? Because that --

10 MS. BERRY: My car was parked -- my car was parked  
11 out in the parking lot that they designated for anyone to  
12 park, and you could not park there if you had an  
13 advertisement, or you were -- but other than that, no. I  
14 did not park close to the polling place. You would have  
15 to know Glennville and the old middle school auditorium  
16 area where they held the election to know what I'm talking  
17 about. We parked on the far side of the parking lot where  
18 it was the safe distance that you could not cross the  
19 voting line to campaign.

20 MR. MASHBURN: I'm sorry to interrupt. So you -- you  
21 were in the part where they said don't have any signs on  
22 your cars?

23 MS. BERRY: No. It didn't have anything up there  
24 that said that. I just wouldn't do that. I would not  
25 have had any signs or set up -- I know when we set up for

1 Election Day, you know, they had designated areas for us  
2 to put our tents up and everything, so that's why I said  
3 that. But this particular day there were no signs.

4 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Berry.

5 MR. MASHBURN: Thank you.

6 MS. BERRY: Okay.

7 MS. LE: Ms. Berry, this is Anh Le.

8 MS. BERRY: Mmm-hmm.

9 MS. LE: Thank you for being here today. So the  
10 citation, the code that's being cited is 21-2-414(d) for  
11 the violation, and part of it is that as a candidate, it  
12 prohibits a candidate from going back into the polling  
13 place.

14 MS. BERRY: Which I did not do. No, ma'am.

15 MS. LE: So you did not, right?

16 MS. BERRY: I did not do that, ma'am. I promise you.  
17 Hand to God. I did not go back into the polling booth.  
18 I'm telling you. I had to deal with the nastiest campaign  
19 ever. Not on my behalf because I ran a decent campaign.  
20 I ran a campaign, a lawful campaign. I was told, you  
21 know, that, you know, certain things I should have  
22 reported, whatever. I said no. I just want the election  
23 over, let the people vote, vote for whom they want to, and  
24 I will bow out respectfully and move on, and that's what I  
25 did. I had no idea that all of this was going on, no idea

1 that they were setting it up, and my -- this is my  
2 personal feelings. They were setting this up so that if  
3 they lost the election that they could do just this,  
4 what's going on right now. The people knew it was wrong.  
5 They didn't even come out to vote. People did not vote  
6 rather than go against them or whatever. They just  
7 refused to go to the polls to vote, and those who went  
8 voted one way for the mayor and didn't vote for anything  
9 else in that ward.

10 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Berry. Did you have  
11 any additional questions, Ms. Le?

12 MS. LE: No, no. Thank you.

13 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. The recommendation is to bind  
14 this case over to the Attorney General's Office. Do we  
15 have a motion to that effect?

16 MR. MASHBURN: Matt Mashburn, I move that we accept  
17 the recommendation.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: Is there a second?

19 MS. LE: This is Anh Le. I'll second it. I think  
20 there's some facts that could be ironed out. Maybe the  
21 Attorney General's Office can help with that with respect  
22 to the violation being cited, so I second the motion.

23 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second. Is  
24 there any further discussion? All in favor, please  
25 signify by saying aye.

1 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

2 MS. SULLIVAN: And there are none opposed. Thank  
3 you, Ms. Berry. The next case before us is case number  
4 2019-045. Ms. Watson?

5 MS. WATSON: During the November 5th, 2019 City of  
6 Guyton general election, we received the following  
7 complaints. The complainant reports during the counting  
8 of the votes that witnesses reporting the early voting  
9 ballots were lying flat in the bottom of the box. Akira  
10 Garban [ph.] states ballots were not folded properly like  
11 the others, and she believed that signaled that they had  
12 been tampered with. The complainant believed the ballot  
13 boxes opened so someone could view the early votes.  
14 Second allegation, the complainant provided a photograph  
15 taken of the surveillance camera that showed Election  
16 Supervisor Alison Bruton had a clear view of some voters  
17 when they cast their ballot during the early voting, that  
18 the camera was positioned so you could view a voter while  
19 they were in the voting booth.

20 Allegation three, it was reported that a voter named  
21 Lynn Kent [ph.] was disabled because of problems with her  
22 eyesight. The complainant states the poll worker advised  
23 Ms. Kent's daughter she could sign her name on the ballot,  
24 but now the poll manager says Ms. Kent's vote must be  
25 thrown out. Allegation four, the complainant reported

1 they don't feel like the ballots were all counted  
2 correctly, and the second complainant states that she  
3 thinks we need a recount.

4 Investigation revealed there was no substantiating  
5 evidence to support violation of the election code in  
6 reference to allegations one, three, and four. The ballot  
7 box was in clear view of the surveillance camera. When  
8 done for the day during advance voting, a security seal  
9 was placed over the opening to the ballot box. For  
10 further security, voters were to fold the ballot before  
11 placing it in the box, but some voters chose not to do so.  
12 The surveillance tape was reviewed and corroborated that  
13 no one entered the ballot box and that some voters did not  
14 fold their ballots.

15 In reference to allegation two, the investigation  
16 revealed early voting was held in the conference room of  
17 City Hall. The conference room was equipped with a  
18 surveillance camera. The field of view of the camera  
19 shows the ballot box and one of the voting booths. The  
20 monitor for the surveillance camera was located in City  
21 Clerk Election Superintendent Alison Bruton's office. It  
22 was learned if someone had access to the monitor, they  
23 could zoom the camera in to have a closer view of the  
24 voting booth. Election Superintendent Alison Bruton was  
25 questioned to see if she or anyone else used the camera

1 system to view an elector when they voted their ballot.  
2 Alison Bruton denied using the camera system to view an  
3 elector casting their ballot or knowing if anyone else had  
4 done so. There is no evidence Alison Bruton or anyone  
5 else used the camera system to view a voter's ballot as  
6 they were marking their selections. When City Manager  
7 Daniel Hoffman learned about the field of view of the  
8 surveillance camera, he covered the camera up in the  
9 conference room. Our recommendation is for the City of  
10 Guyton and Alison Bruton be referred to the AG's Office  
11 for violation of 21-2-267(a), polling place's equipment  
12 arrangement in that a voting booth was located in view of  
13 a surveillance camera. The booth was not screened from  
14 observation of others if they had access to the camera  
15 system.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. I do believe we have  
17 someone on the line that would like to address this case.

18 MS. THOMAS: Yes, Mr. Griffin.

19 MR. GRIFFIN: Yes. This is Brian --

20 MS. SULLIVAN: Mr. Griffin, please go ahead.

21 MR. GRIFFIN: This is Brian Griffin with the law firm  
22 of Oliver Maner, and I represent the City of Guyton. Can  
23 you hear me?

24 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes, we can.

25 MR. GRIFFIN: Good morning. So the City acknowledges

1 that this violation happened, but Ms. Bruton, who set up  
2 the voting booths, just simply failed to take the camera  
3 into account when she did so. This was clearly  
4 inadvertent, and notably, as soon as it was brought to the  
5 City's attention, they covered up the camera, and there is  
6 no evidence that Ms. Bruton or anybody else used the  
7 camera system to actually view a voter's ballot as they  
8 made the selection, and it's also worth noting that this  
9 year's -- this year's advance voting will -- or any other  
10 voting will not happen at the City Hall. So, you know,  
11 these issues have been addresses. They were addressed  
12 immediately as we -- you know, as it came to the City's  
13 attention, and there's no evidence that, you know, the  
14 secret ballot was -- was violated. So with that in mind,  
15 I respectfully request that the City of Guyton be issued a  
16 letter of instruction and that this case be dismissed.

17 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Mr. Griffin, for being here  
18 and, you know, providing that information. Do any of the  
19 Board members have questions for Mr. Griffin?

20 MS. LE: This is Anh Le. I have one.

21 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes, Ms. Le. Go ahead.

22 MS. LE: Thank you. Is the camera recorded, sir? Is  
23 there any recordation of this -- of any of the votes cast?

24 MR. GRIFFIN: Based on the findings of the  
25 investigator that said they reviewed the surveillance

1 footage to, you know, ensure other things, it was seem  
2 that there was.

3 MS. LE: And what have we done with that recording?

4 MR. GRIFFIN: To my knowledge, it has been destroyed.  
5 Well, I'm not positive on that. I believe that it's  
6 likely not still there, unless it's in the hands of the  
7 investigator.

8 MS. LE: Frances, do we know that -- how the  
9 recording has been treated since...

10 MS. WATSON: We did not take possession of the -- of  
11 the recordings.

12 MS. SULLIVAN: The Secretary of State's Office does  
13 not have possession of the recordings.

14 MR. GRIFFIN: So the --

15 MS. SULLIVAN: Go ahead.

16 MR. GRIFFIN: With that being the case, I know that  
17 the -- the City does not keep long-term records of its --  
18 of its surveillance footage, so I think it's highly likely  
19 that this -- you know, this recording no longer exists.

20 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. I believe the investigator  
21 would like to address the Board.

22 MR. ARCHIE: This is Investigator Archie. I did  
23 retrieve video from the surveillance camera. It's also  
24 included with my case file. The recording does show some  
25 voters as they were voting, and the majority of the times,

1 the voters, when they went up to the booth, their bodies  
2 would cover the process of them voting. There were a few  
3 that if you did zoom in, you could possibly see the  
4 selections they made, but the recordings are with the case  
5 files.

6 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you for that clarification. The  
7 recommendation -- are there any further questions from any  
8 of the members of the Board? The recommendation is to  
9 bind this case over to the Attorney General's Office. Is  
10 there a motion?

11 MR. MASHBURN: I move that we accept the  
12 recommendation.

13 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion to accept the  
14 recommendation. Is there a second?

15 MS. LE: Anh Le, I'll second it.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Any further discussion? All in favor  
17 of the motion, please signify by saying aye.

18 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

19 MS. SULLIVAN: And that's none opposed. Thank you,  
20 Mr. Griffin, for being here. The next case that we have  
21 is case number 2019-047, Lowndes County. Ms. Watson?

22 MS. WATSON: During the November 5th, 2019 Lowndes  
23 County general election, the following complaints were  
24 reported. The poll manager Douglas Duvall [ph.] allowed  
25 an individual without a valid form of identification, and

1 Larry Rogers [ph.] reported that he received a provisional  
2 letter in the mail for an Anthony Johnson [ph.]. Mr.  
3 Rogers has resided at 3292 Country Club Drive since 1995,  
4 and he did not know a Mr. Johnson.

5 Investigation revealed that poll manager Doug Duvall  
6 allowed Cara Blunt [ph.] to vote without a valid picture  
7 ID. This occurred during the November 5th, 2019 general  
8 election at the Rainwater voting precinct in Valdosta,  
9 Georgia. Ms. Butler said she originally informed the  
10 voter that she would have to vote provisionally since she  
11 did not have a valid picture ID. Ms. Butler said the  
12 voter only had a nametag and checkbook. Ms. Butler said  
13 the voter was ultimately allowed to vote on one of the  
14 machines but only after the poll manager, Doug Duvall,  
15 instructed her to do.

16 Allegation two, the investigation did not show -- or  
17 did show that voter Anthony Johnson listed Country Club  
18 Drive, Valdosta, Georgia as his residential address when  
19 he completed the voter registration in 2019. At the time  
20 of the complaint, the address was owned by William Rogers,  
21 who had resided there since 1995. Anthony Johnson has  
22 never resided at this address. Lowndes County Election  
23 Supervisor Deb Cox provided a copy of the envelope,  
24 provisional ballot letter, and voter registration. The  
25 envelope was addressed to Anthony Johnson, and the address

1 listed was Country Club Drive, Valdosta, Georgia. The  
2 letter was informing Mr. Johnson that his provisional  
3 ballot for the November 5th, 2019 general election was  
4 counted. The voter registration showed Mr. Johnson listed  
5 Country Club Drive as his residential address. Our  
6 recommendation is for Doug Duvall, the poll manager, and  
7 Frances Butler, the assistant manager, be bound over to  
8 the AG's Office for 21-2-417(b), presentation of  
9 identification, when they allowed Cara Blunt to vote on a  
10 machine without a valid picture ID and Anthony Johnson be  
11 bound over to the Attorney General's Office for violation  
12 of 21-2-561, false registration, and 21-2-571.

13 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. I believe we have two people  
14 here that would like to address the Board regarding this  
15 case.

16 MS. THOMAS: Yes. Frances Butler and Deb Cox with  
17 Lowndes County is on the line to answer any question.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: Would either one of you like to  
19 address the Board?

20 MS. COX: This is Deb Cox. No, I would not unless  
21 the Board has a question.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you for being here. Do  
23 any of the Board members have any questions for Lowndes  
24 County?

25 MR. MASHBURN: I don't have any questions.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay.

2 MS. THOMAS: And Frances Butler, you may speak now,  
3 if you would like to. You're unmuted.

4 MS. SULLIVAN: Ms. Butler, would you like to address  
5 the Board?

6 MS. THOMAS: You're unmuted. You can speak now.

7 MS. SULLIVAN: She may just be here to answer  
8 questions as well.

9 MS. THOMAS: Yes. We cannot hear you, but it does  
10 show that you're unmuted.

11 MS. WATSON: Ms. Butler -- this is Frances Watson.  
12 Frances Butler did contact me yesterday or the day before  
13 and advised that she would be on the -- on the call and  
14 wanted to clarify that she did bring the voter ID issue to  
15 the poll manager's attention and that it was his decision  
16 to proceed based on the information that was provided and  
17 that she did report it to the County afterwards, and with  
18 that information, I would not be opposed for a letter of  
19 instruction to Ms. Butler.

20 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Watson. Ms. Butler,  
21 would you like to speak?

22 MS. THOMAS: She said thank you. I asked her for her  
23 comment, but she said thank you.

24 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay.

25 MR. MASHBURN: This is Matt Mashburn. Just so I've

1 got it clear, Ms. Butler was acting under the authority of  
2 Mr. Duvall, the poll manager? Okay. So the amendment to  
3 the recommendation is that we -- or that the inspectors  
4 would not oppose a letter of instruction for Ms. Butler  
5 but to refer Doug Duvall to the Attorney General?

6 MS. WATSON: Correct.

7 MR. MASHBURN: This is Matt Mashburn. I make a  
8 motion that we adopt the amended report of the  
9 investigators.

10 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. We have a motion on the table.  
11 Is there a second?

12 MS. LE: Mr. Mashburn, so you're recommending that we  
13 issue a letter of instruction to -- for Ms. Frances Butler  
14 and to the Attorney General, Doug Duvall, Anthony Johnson,  
15 and... them. Is that correct?

16 MR. MASHBURN: Yes. Thank you for clarifying that.  
17 I had left off the Anthony Johnson, so thank you very  
18 much. That's correct.

19 MS. LE: Okay.

20 MR. MASHBURN: So we're referring -- my motion is to  
21 refer Doug Duvall and Anthony Johnson to the Attorney  
22 General and issue Frances Butler a letter of instruction.

23 MS. LE: I second that.

24 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second. Is  
25 there any further discussion? All in favor, please

1 signify by saying aye.

2 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

3 MS. THOMAS: I have Ms. Butler on the line if you --

4 MS. SULLIVAN: We have -- okay. I believe that we  
5 have just voted. Are there any opposed? Okay. That  
6 motion passes. Does Ms. Butler want to address the Board  
7 at this point?

8 MS. THOMAS: Would you like to address the Board?  
9 Yes.

10 MS. SULLIVAN: Go ahead, Ms. Butler.

11 MS. BUTLER: Okay. My name is Frances Butler.

12 MS. THOMAS: Ms. Butler, on your speaker on your  
13 computer, just turn your volume down because we hear an  
14 echo.

15 MS. BUTLER: Okay. Can you hear me now?

16 MS. THOMAS: Yes.

17 MS. BUTLER: Yes. My name is Frances Butler, and I'm  
18 just one of the assistant -- well, I'm the assistant  
19 manager with Mr. Duvall. Now, when the person came up to  
20 [sound cuts out] can you hear me a little bit better?

21 MS. THOMAS: Yes. That's a little better. We can  
22 still hear the echo from your computer.

23 MS. BUTLER: Oh, wow, okay. [sound cuts out]

24 MS. THOMAS: Yes.

25 MS. BUTLER: Okay. [sound cuts out] so what I did

1 was -- I told him I needed to [sound cuts out]

2 THE COURT REPORTER: Board members, I'm so sorry.

3 This is the court reporter. I can't hear anything.

4 MS. THOMAS: Hello? Okay, go ahead. Can you hear  
5 her now, Kate?

6 THE COURT REPORTER: Yes, thank you. Now I can hear  
7 her.

8 MS. BUTLER: Okay. What I was saying is that I had  
9 actually -- I do not know what part I had left off, but  
10 anyway, when the -- when the lady had shown me her ID, it  
11 was a badge. I said no, ma'am. I'm sorry. We can't take  
12 that, and then she showed me her checkbook, and I said no,  
13 ma'am. We can't take that. So I said however, you can  
14 vote provisional, so I said let me -- let me talk to my  
15 supervisor. So I brought this up to Mr. Duvall. After  
16 that, Mr. Duvall said was she in the system? And I'm  
17 like, yes, sir. I said but, you know, she doesn't --  
18 well, anyway, I just told him yes, she was in the system.  
19 He said yeah, well, then let her go. I'm like, no, I don't  
20 think so, you know. So after she's done, I said well let  
21 me write something so I can have this documented, so  
22 after, I wrote it, and I gave it to Mr. Duvall. Mr.  
23 Duvall said oh, no. I don't think you should do this.  
24 You're going to get in trouble. I said no. You're going  
25 to get in trouble, so he told me to tear it up.

1           Now, as a twenty-three-year United States Army  
2 retiree, I know better, but I also listen to supervision  
3 because who is over me -- these are the things that I  
4 always did in the Army. Even though I knew it was wrong,  
5 okay, it bothered me so much that night that I'm like, oh,  
6 this is wrong. So the next morning, fortunately, I think  
7 it was either Ms. Monique or Ms. Cox, but I think it was  
8 Ms. Monique that called me so that I could come in and  
9 sign some -- some other -- I guess some other documents,  
10 some other forms that I did not finish signing, and from  
11 there is when I said I can't -- I can't do this. So I --  
12 I brought it up to -- I think it was Ms. Cox -- but I  
13 brought it up to them about what had happened, and so they  
14 told me to sit down and write the information because my  
15 integrity of spending all of that time, twenty-three  
16 years, in the Army and sixteen years in reserves, I knew  
17 better.

18           I don't think Mr. Duvall knew who I was, so this is  
19 why I had brought all of this up, but I did check the  
20 lady. She did not have any identity. I did bring it up  
21 to Mr. Duvall. Unfortunately, that's the way everything  
22 happened, but I was -- I was following the instructions of  
23 what I was supposed to do. Well, I actually had followed  
24 his instructions when he told me to tear up the paper that  
25 I had written because I wanted to keep a -- sort of, like,

1 a documentation of what had happened so if that comes up,  
2 then it would be something that I had written. But he  
3 told me no, I was going to get in trouble, and I told him  
4 no, you're going to get in trouble, so he told me to tear  
5 it up, and as a good soldier, that's what I did. But  
6 that, I knew that that was wrong.

7 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Butler. Thank you for  
8 your comments. We have already voted on this case, and  
9 the other Respondents will be referred to the Attorney  
10 General's Office, but the allegations against you will not  
11 be based on that motion. So thank you very much for being  
12 here and for bringing this to our attention.

13 MS. THOMAS: Have a good day.

14 MS. SULLIVAN: The next case on the agenda is 2019-  
15 049, City of Palmetto.

16 MS. WATSON: In November 2019, we received numerous  
17 calls from voters in Palmetto, Fulton County, stating that  
18 their precinct cards for the municipal election listed the  
19 poll location as the library. When they arrived, they  
20 found the information was incorrect and were seeking  
21 assistance in locating the poll location. Investigation  
22 shows Fulton County Board of Registration and Elections  
23 changed the municipal polling location for Fulton County  
24 residents of the City of Palmetto to the Palmetto Library,  
25 the same location that Fulton County uses for county,

1 state, and federal elections. This data entry was made in  
2 Election Net on March the 11th of 2016. The City of  
3 Palmetto did not request the change in poll locations as  
4 the polls for municipal elections is and have always been  
5 at City Hall. The City wishes to continue to hold  
6 elections at City Hall. The Fulton County Board of  
7 Registration and Elections did not notify the City of  
8 Palmetto it was making the change. This change resulted  
9 in causing confusion about where to vote amongst voters.

10 Ralph Jones advised the change was made to bring all  
11 municipal polling stations in Fulton County in line with  
12 state and county poll locations to reduce confusion among  
13 voters. Our recommendation is for Fulton County Board of  
14 Registration and Elections, Richard Barron, Director of  
15 Fulton County Registration and Elections, and Ralph Jones,  
16 former Registrar -- Chief Registrar of Fulton County be  
17 bound over to the Attorney General's Office for 21-2-  
18 216(b), duties of county board.

19 MS. THOMAS: And on the line, we have first Patrick  
20 Stough with the City of Palmetto.

21 MR. STOUGH: Yes.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: Go ahead, Mr. Stough.

23 MR. STOUGH: Thank you. Good morning. My name is  
24 Patrick Stough. I'm with the city attorney's office for  
25 the City of Palmetto. I'm -- we're not a Respondent on

1 this, but I did want to clarify a couple of things. First  
2 of all, the City of Palmetto conducts its own municipal  
3 elections. Fulton County does not conduct those for the  
4 City, and also, the City of -- the mayor and council for  
5 the City of Palmetto has never voted to move the polling  
6 location from City Hall to the library. That's all I  
7 really have to say on this, unless the Board has any  
8 questions.

9 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Mr. Stough. Does any Board  
10 member have any questions for him?

11 MS. GHAZAL: Yes, ma'am. This is Sara Ghazal. I --  
12 I would like to ask him a quick question. When the County  
13 does conduct elections at the library, has there ever been  
14 consideration for the municipality to also hold its  
15 elections at the same location?

16 MR. STOUGH: Not -- not that I'm aware of. There may  
17 have been discussions in the past about Fulton County  
18 conducting elections for the City, but I don't think those  
19 conversations have ever gone anywhere. We've always --  
20 the City has always just conducted its own elections its  
21 own way. We're -- the City actually sits on the border of  
22 Fulton County and Coweta County, and there's a portion of  
23 it that's in Coweta County, so that may cause an issue  
24 with having Fulton County do the elections, but yeah.  
25 It's not a consideration that I'm aware has ever been

1 made.

2 MS. GHAZAL: And can you clarify what County the City  
3 Hall is located in?

4 MR. STOUGH: It's in Fulton County.

5 MS. GHAZAL: Thank you.

6 MS. THOMAS: And then we also have David Lowman and  
7 Shamira Marshall with Fulton County on the line.

8 MS. SULLIVAN: Mr. Lowman, go ahead.

9 MR. LOWMAN: Yes. I will have Ms. Shamira Marshall,  
10 the registration manager, provide additional information  
11 at this time.

12 MS. MARSHALL: Hello, yes.

13 MS. SULLIVAN: Go ahead.

14 MS. MARSHALL: Okay. Thank you. I'm Shamira  
15 Marshall, the current registration manager, and in  
16 speaking with Mr. Jones in reference to this case, the  
17 former registration chief, he basically explained to me  
18 that there was a lack of communication between the  
19 municipality and the county. He did tell me that on March  
20 11th, he discussed with the municipality of -- in  
21 accordance with having the one location for voters that he  
22 was going to make a change in the system in which he did  
23 it at -- he had one of the employees in the office to  
24 actually make the change, and at that time, there was one  
25 municipal location located on the municipality's website

1 and then another one on Fulton County's website. So  
2 basically, it was just a miscommunication.

3 Present day, we have sent the letter or notice that  
4 will be mailed to the current voters in the City of  
5 Palmetto for the upcoming municipal election to let them  
6 know that the County election will be hosted at the  
7 library, and the municipal election will be hosted at City  
8 Hall. But I myself sent that to the current registrar,  
9 and I have not received back any input or, you know,  
10 agreeance or dis-agreeance, so just moving forward, we are  
11 trying to alleviate this problem. That's all I have.

12 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Marshall. Are there  
13 any questions for Ms. Marshall?

14 MS. THOMAS: And Rick Barron just raised his hand to  
15 speak.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Go ahead, Mr. Barron.

17 MR. BARRON: In speaking with Mr. Jones too, what I -  
18 - I think at one point what we had done is sent out  
19 something to all of the municipalities, and we were in --  
20 we had encouraged all of them to use the same polling  
21 places that the county -- this was the only location of  
22 which I'm aware that was different between the county  
23 location and the municipal location. I'm unsure about if  
24 there was any conversation between Mr. Jones and the City  
25 of Palmetto, but we were worried about, at the time, there

1 being disenfranchisement between the voters if they have  
2 to go to two different locations as they will have to in  
3 the fall. They'll have to go to our location to vote on  
4 the ESPLOST and the TSPLOST, and then they'll have to vote  
5 on the other -- their other issues down at City Hall. And  
6 many times, voters don't want to go to two places -- two  
7 separate places to vote, so at the time, we were pushing  
8 all the municipalities, I believe when this change was  
9 made, to have the same municipal and county polling  
10 locations, and that was the gist of it was voter  
11 disenfranchisement. But other than that, I don't have the  
12 details or the background on it.

13 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. Any Board members have any  
14 questions for Mr. Barron?

15 MR. MASHBURN: I do not.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank y'all for being here and  
17 for your explanations. The recommendation is for this to  
18 be bound over to the Attorney General's Office.

19 MR. MASHBURN: This is Matt Mashburn. I move that we  
20 accept the recommendation and proceed accordingly.

21 MS, SULLIVAN: Do we have a second?

22 MS. GHAZAL: I would like to --

23 MS. LE: This is Anh. I'll second. I'm sorry.  
24 Please, Ms. Ghazal, go ahead.

25 MS. GHAZAL: No. I -- I would like to second this

1 with -- with a comment that as a matter of policy, I agree  
2 with Mr. Barron that the best policy is to co-locate  
3 municipal and county elections where possible, but  
4 obviously, in this case, it was -- more voter confusion  
5 was caused by giving incorrect information to the voters.

6 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. So we have a motion and a  
7 second. Is there any further discussion? All in favor,  
8 please say aye.

9 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

10 MS. SULLIVAN: Any opposed? And that motion passes.  
11 Thank you. The next case is 2019-052, Brooks County.

12 MS. WATSON: A complainant alleged she received an  
13 incorrect ballot when she went to vote during the Brooks  
14 County general election on November 5th, 2019. Instead of  
15 receiving a ballot for District 2 Post 4, she received a  
16 ballot for District 1 Post 2. Ms. Golden [ph.] says she  
17 received and voted a ballot with a single, unopposed  
18 candidate, Louis Mark [ph.] Louis Mark was running for  
19 City Council seat District 1 Post 2, and Mrs. Golden's  
20 voting area during the election was District 2 Post 4.  
21 The District 2 Post 4 ballot had a single race between  
22 Mark Demane [ph.] and Christina Guys [ph.] for City  
23 Council. Brooks County Election Supervisor Charles Day  
24 confirmed that Stephanie Golden voted in the November 5th,  
25 2019 general election. Mr. Day said Ms. Golden was

1 assigned to municipal voting District 2 Post 4 and should  
2 have received a ballot for the city council race between  
3 Mark Demane and Christina Guys.

4 Investigation interviewed all poll workers who at the  
5 Quitman Agricultural Annex poll location during the  
6 November 5th, 2019 general election but was unable to  
7 determine which poll worker issued Ms. Golden's voter  
8 access card. None of the poll workers recalled an issue  
9 where a voter received an incorrect ballot. Our  
10 recommendation is to refer Brooks County Board of  
11 Elections and Registration and Charles Day, the Election  
12 Supervisor, and Caroline Barnes [ph.], the poll manager,  
13 for violation of SEB rule 183-1-12.02(3), conducting  
14 elections, when voter Stephanie Golden was issued an  
15 incorrect ballot to her voter access card during the  
16 November 5th general election.

17 MS. SULLIVAN: It is my understanding that we do not  
18 have anyone present on the line to speak regarding this  
19 case. The recommendation is to bind it over to the  
20 Attorney General's Office.

21 MR. MASHBURN: Matt Mashburn, I move that we accept  
22 the recommendation.

23 MS. SULLIVAN: Is there a second?

24 MS. GHAZAL: This is Sara Ghazal. I've actually got  
25 a question or two for the investigating officer here.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Go ahead.

2 MS. GHAZAL: Were you able to identify where the  
3 problem happened? Was this actually a problem at the  
4 electronic poll book, or was the voter incorrectly coded  
5 in Election Net and assigned to the wrong district?

6 MS. WATSON: The voter was -- one second. The voter  
7 was assigned to the correct district. She received the  
8 incorrect ballot.

9 MS. GHAZAL: So the problem was with the coding of  
10 the card itself?

11 MS. WATSON: Correct.

12 MS. GHAZAL: Okay. Thank you. I -- I second the  
13 motion.

14 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second. Is  
15 there any further discussion? All those in favor, please  
16 say aye.

17 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: Any opposed? None opposed. That  
19 motion passes. Next case is 2019-053, City of  
20 Hogansville.

21 MS. WATSON: In November of 2019, we received the  
22 following complaints regarding the City of Hogansville  
23 municipal elections: candidate Toni Striblin was in and  
24 out of the polls mingling with voters, voter being turned  
25 away due to an address issue and another voter with

1 similar issue allowed to vote, a separate report of  
2 candidate Striblin and her husband present inside the poll  
3 at the library.

4 Investigation shows candidate Toni Striblin voted by  
5 absentee ballot on October the 29th of 2019. She stated  
6 she entered the Hogansville Library on Election Day for  
7 the purpose of using the restroom on three occasions.  
8 Kandis Strickland, sister of candidate Theresa Strickland,  
9 used a cellphone to video candidate Toni Striblin standing  
10 in the breezeway of the library outside the room where  
11 voting was taking place. Poll manager Samantha Stitcher  
12 [ph.] confronted Kandis Strickland and told her she could  
13 not video there and that she needed to zip up her jacket  
14 over the campaign t-shirt she was wearing and to delete  
15 the video. Theresa Strickland stated that the video of  
16 Toni Striblin in the library breezeway was given to her by  
17 her sister Kandis.

18 When interviewed, Theresa Strickland could not  
19 provide names for the voters that were reported --  
20 reportedly turned away due to an address issue or the one  
21 allowed to vote. There was insufficient information to  
22 investigate further. Kandis Strickland stated the  
23 candidate for office was observed going into the polls and  
24 out of the polling place multiple times. The poll  
25 supervisor was seen talking with that candidate and her

1 husband, and the poll supervisor told Kandis that they  
2 could be there with their daughter. Kandis -- Kandis'  
3 complaint and statement do not mention her videoing Ms.  
4 Striblin in the library breezeway.

5 In the video that Kandis Strickland took, candidate  
6 Toni Striblin was in the breezeway of the library and  
7 outside the enclosed space for a brief time. Striblin  
8 admits to speaking with the poll manager as to whether or  
9 not her daughter, a first-time voter, was still in the  
10 voting room. Striblin was not displaying any campaign  
11 material at this time.

12 Our recommendation is for Toni Striblin, candidate  
13 for Hogansville City Council, be referred to the Attorney  
14 General's Office for 21-2-414(a)(1) and (a)(3) and Kandis  
15 Strickland be referred to the AG for 21-2-414(a)(1) and  
16 21-2-414(a)(3).

17 MS. SULLIVAN: And I believe we have someone on the  
18 line to address the Board regarding this case.

19 MS. THOMAS: Yes. First, we'll hear from Toni  
20 Striblin.

21 MS. STRIBLIN: Yes. Hello. Thank you for letting me  
22 be here. I was there, and I did go to our polling  
23 director when setting up to, you know, campaign about a  
24 hundred -- over a hundred-and-fifty-feet away from the  
25 building, and I did ask if it would be okay for any of us

1 to use the restroom during the time we were there from  
2 early morning until the end of elections, and she said we  
3 could do that as long as we displayed no -- you know,  
4 nothing on our campaign shirts and didn't campaign, didn't  
5 talk to anybody. So, I mean, that's what I did. I did go  
6 to the bathroom three times during the whole day that I  
7 was there, and the last time that I went, my daughter  
8 happened to come up to vote for the first time, and we  
9 just pointed her in the direction to go, and we went into  
10 the bathroom, my husband and I. When we came back out, we  
11 didn't know if she was out of the polling place or not, so  
12 we just walked over there, so my husband looked to see if  
13 she was out or not to walk her back to her truck, and  
14 that's all we did. I mean, I asked permission from the  
15 person that I thought was in -- responsible there to be  
16 sure it was okay, and I thought that -- I didn't know that  
17 I was doing any campaign violations. I would --

18 MS. THOMAS: And next, we --

19 MS. STRIBLIN: I would prefer to get a letter of  
20 instruction as opposed to being sent anywhere else to the  
21 Attorney General. Thank you.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Striblin. Do we have  
23 someone else on the line?

24 MS. THOMAS: Yes. We also have Theresa Strickland  
25 and Kandis Strickland and Olivia Godwin. Ms. Theresa

1 Strickland, you may go ahead and speak.

2 MS. STRICKLAND: Yes. I, on that particular day, was  
3 bothered by the situation because in our candidate packet,  
4 it states that we can only go into the location to vote.  
5 I knew what we had to do, so I personally got in my  
6 vehicle to go home and not enter that building because I  
7 knew it was wrong. Ms. Striblin went in that building  
8 multiple times. I can't say whether it was to use to  
9 restroom or whatever the case was. I do know that the  
10 restroom is immediately when you enter to the right. That  
11 video, although, you know, it was against the rules. I'm  
12 sure my sister wasn't aware of that at the time. It shows  
13 her in that polling area, that -- there's two doors, a  
14 small one to go through to where the actual polling booths  
15 are, and she was there. Her and her husband walked her  
16 daughter in on that occasion. Three other occasions she  
17 went in alone. She went in with another candidate  
18 throughout that process.

19 You know, someone came up and parked their car in  
20 front of our campaign area, proceeded back to go talk to  
21 Ms. Striblin about the situation. The person left her car  
22 there, and at that time, another candidate's niece left  
23 their area where they had been sitting all day and came by  
24 us and said that's not right. I don't have anything to do  
25 with that. So the behavior, in and out of that building,

1 was not appropriate, and going to the restroom would not  
2 have put her anywhere near that, and prior to that, she  
3 had also spoken with Ms. Stitcher outside the building, so  
4 she was on that property a good bit, and I don't think  
5 that was right, and although --

6 MS. SULLIVAN: All right. Do you have any comments  
7 regarding the other allegations?

8 MS. STRICKLAND: I'm sorry?

9 MS. SULLIVAN: Did you have any comments regarding  
10 any of the other allegations that were discussed? There's  
11 also a complaint regarding Ms. Kandis Strickland.

12 MS. STRICKLAND: Yes. That's what I speaking to.  
13 Kandis Strickland, you know, didn't know she couldn't take  
14 the video, but Ms. Striblin had gone in that building so  
15 many times. I had reached out to Lisa Kelly [ph.],  
16 couldn't reach her, who is the supervisor over elections.  
17 I even called the county rep to try to speak to someone  
18 about this matter. This was about 4:30. It had been just  
19 going on throughout the day, and so Kandy went in to see  
20 where she was, and she --

21 MR. MASHBURN: Hey. Hey, Ms. Strickland? Ms.  
22 Strickland, this is Matt Mashburn. I just have a question  
23 for you. Sorry to interrupt you, but let me just ask you  
24 one question. Was Kandis Strickland ever within the  
25 hundred-and-fifty-feet of the polling location wearing

1 campaign materials?

2 MS. STRICKLAND: She was.

3 MR. MASHBURN: Just a yes or no question.

4 MS. STRICKLAND: Hello? This is Kandis Strickland.

5 MS. SULLIVAN: Kandis Strickland, please go ahead and  
6 address that question.

7 MS. STRICKLAND: Yes. This is Kandis Strickland, and  
8 I would like to address that question. Sir, I was not --  
9 I had my campaign material on under not a zipped jacket.  
10 I had on a buttoned blue jean jacket, and that button was  
11 -- it was buttoned all the way up to the top. No one saw  
12 any campaign material. Yes, I did -- I did not know that  
13 you could not video, but I thought it was strange that she  
14 was -- Toni Striblin was standing at the door talking to  
15 the poll manager for a long period of time. It was not a  
16 brief period of time. When I walked in, she was already  
17 there over at the door where you entered to vote. I went  
18 in the restroom. When I came back out, she was still  
19 there, and I'm like, why is she here? Still there, so I  
20 videoed. Yes, I did. But I did not display material for  
21 anybody to see at the polling place.

22 I also want to make the comment that the investigator  
23 never talked to me. When I got home, there was a card on  
24 my table. I asked my daughter -- I said where did this  
25 card come from? She said Mom, it was in the door, so I do

1 not appreciate him coming to my home without speaking to  
2 me. If we had had a conversation about him coming to my  
3 home or him meeting with me, I would have been there. I  
4 don't think that's right for you to show up at someone's  
5 home without making proper arrangements, and I will say  
6 again --

7 MR. MASHBURN: Okay. So --

8 MS. STRICKLAND: -- I did not --

9 MR. MASHBURN: This is Matt Mashburn. Let me ask you  
10 a follow-up question, if I can, please. So how did you  
11 get to where you videotaped? Were you already there, or  
12 did you come in from outside the hundred-and-fifty-foot  
13 for the sole purpose of videotaping, and then you left, or  
14 what were you doing inside the hundred-and-fifty-foot when  
15 you videotaped?

16 MS. STRICKLAND: I was going to the restroom, and  
17 when I came in to use the restroom, the restroom was right  
18 inside the door. I went to use the restroom. She was  
19 already there. She had already walked her daughter in.  
20 She was in there a long period of time, so when I walked  
21 in, I was like, gosh, she's over there by the door where  
22 people go in to vote. I went on, used the restroom. When  
23 I came back out, she was still there. In this world, if  
24 it's -- if it's not in black and white and if it's not  
25 videotaped, then it didn't happen. I did not know I could

1 not videotape in there, and when the poll manager told me  
2 I could not have it there, I immediately put it away.

3 MR. MASHBURN: Okay. Thank you.

4 MS. STRICKLAND: What was your next question, sir?

5 MR. MASHBURN: That was all my questions. Thank you.

6 MS. STRICKLAND: You're welcome.

7 MS. THOMAS: And then we also have Olivia Godwin on  
8 the line. You may unmute yourself and speak now, if you  
9 would like to.

10 MS. GODWIN: Yes. My name is Olivia Godwin. I'm  
11 basically just a witness. I actually saw Ms. Striblin  
12 going in and out of the poll with her campaign shirts on  
13 as well. I did not witness Ms. Strickland, Kandis  
14 Strickland, taking a video, and I think maybe the reason  
15 she did take the video was due to she witnessed her doing  
16 something that was unjustifiable or a violation to the  
17 campaign. And like I said, when Ms. Striblin went into  
18 the voting poll, she went several times, which was  
19 immediately, like, back-to-back. So if she was using the  
20 restroom -- and that's why it was so concerning to us as,  
21 you know, people out there witnessing her doing this and  
22 nothing being done about the situation. It's because she  
23 did it on several occasions, which was, like, back-to-  
24 back. It's not like she went to the restroom one hour and  
25 then went back two hours later, you know. She saw her

1 daughter came up. She had just --

2 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you.

3 MS. GODWIN: -- walked out of the polling. Pardon  
4 me?

5 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Godwin.

6 MR. MASHBURN: This is Matt Mashburn. I just have a  
7 brief question for you, Ms. Godwin. So you're telling us  
8 that you saw Kandis Strickland within a hundred-and-fifty-  
9 feet of the polling location, right?

10 MS. GODWIN: No. I did not -- I did not say that.

11 MR. MASHBURN: Okay. Was Kandis Strickland within a  
12 hundred-and-a-fifty-feet of the polling location?

13 MS. GODWIN: I'm not sure.

14 MR. MASHBURN: Okay. Thank you.

15 MS. GODWIN: Mmm-hmm.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Was there an attempt -- Ms. Watson, an  
17 attempt made to interview Ms. Kandis Strickland?

18 MS. WATSON: That was the purpose of going and  
19 leaving the card to try to speak to her.

20 MS. SULLIVAN: Ms. Strickland, did you reach out to  
21 the investigator after the card was left at your house?

22 MS. THOMAS: You can unmute yourself now.

23 MS. STRICKLAND: Yes. I emailed him.

24 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you. Do any of the Board  
25 members have any additional questions? Okay. The

1 recommendation is to refer both --

2 MS. THOMAS: Toni Striblin would like to say one more

3 --

4 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay, Ms. Striblin. Go ahead briefly.

5 MS. STRIBLIN: Hi.

6 MS. SULLIVAN: Just briefly, please.

7 MS. STRIBLIN: Hey. Yes. I just wanted to follow up  
8 that I had never shown any of my campaign -- my shirt was  
9 not in view. My jacket was zipped up the entire time. I  
10 followed the instructions of the polling director, and I  
11 went in three times over the whole day, so I just wanted  
12 to clarify my statement, and if there's anything I need to  
13 learn from this, please send me a letter of instruction.  
14 Thank you.

15 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you. Would any of the  
16 Board members like to make a motion?

17 MR. MASHBURN: Matt Mashburn, I move that we accept  
18 the recommendation for both allegations.

19 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion to accept the  
20 recommendation of the investigator on this matter. Do we  
21 have a second?

22 MS. LE: Anh Le, I'll second it.

23 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second. Is  
24 there any further discussion? All in favor, please say  
25 aye.

1 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

2 MS. SULLIVAN: And that's none opposed, and that  
3 motion passes. Thank you all for being here. The next  
4 case is 2020-025, Liberty County.

5 MS. WATSON: On June 9th, 2020, the Secretary of  
6 State's Office receiving the following complaints during  
7 the general primary election in Liberty County.

8 Complainant Kevin Burns [ph.] reported when he presented  
9 himself at Precinct 2 to vote, he selected to vote a  
10 Republican ballot. Mr. Burns advised a poll worker told  
11 him the only way he could vote for local officials would  
12 be if he selected a Democratic ballot. Mr. Burns stated  
13 the poll worker said I am not trying to change your mind.  
14 Complainant Shane Patty [ph.] reported he arrived at the  
15 polling precinct at 6:30 A.M., and he was the third person  
16 in line to vote. Shane Patty stated the poll workers were  
17 having issues with the machines. Shane Patty advised  
18 people were leaving, and the machines were going down.  
19 Shane stated the poll did not open until 7:30 A.M., and he  
20 did not leave until 8:45 A.M.

21 Complainant Richard Austin [ph.] reported when he  
22 presented himself at Precinct 6 to vote, a poll worker  
23 repeatedly told him and others if they voted a Republican  
24 ballot, they could not vote for the local officials.  
25 Richard Austin alleged that several poll workers had

1 candidate reelection shirts inside out, and you could  
2 still see -- make out what they said.

3 Investigation revealed as to allegation one, Kevin  
4 Burns, he was told he was not eligible due to an absentee  
5 ballot being issued to him. Mr. Burns advised it took  
6 approximately thirty minutes to work through cancelling  
7 the absentee ballot so he could proceed to vote. The poll  
8 worker then assisted Mr. Burns, advised the voter who had  
9 enquired which local races were on the ballot, and she  
10 told him that most of them were on the Democratic ballot.  
11 There was no substantiation of the violations.

12 Investigation revealed in reference to allegation two  
13 that 11 of the 13 polls in Liberty County failed to open  
14 at 7 A.M. Liberty County attorney L. Kelly Davis states  
15 some of the delays were due to inadequate training of  
16 election workers regarding set-up of voting machines and  
17 related accessories. Attorney Davis states some of the  
18 delays were due to weather or inadequate mechanical  
19 systems. Attorney Davis states some of the delays were  
20 due to poll pads being delivered late to most polling  
21 places due to human error. Attorney Davis states at  
22 Precinct 3, three voting machines were unable to be used  
23 due to set-up issues.

24 In reference to allegation 3, the poll workers for  
25 Precinct 6 were interviewed, and they all stated they nor

1 any poll workers wore any shirts turned inside out or a  
2 shirt with candidate information worn on it. The poll  
3 workers all state they did not advise voters to vote one  
4 ticket or the other. Several reported that voters that  
5 requested a Republican ballot and did not see the sheriff  
6 race on the ballot would ask why it was not on the ballot,  
7 that many canceled the Republican ballot and were issued  
8 the Democratic ballot.

9 Our recommendation is for Liberty County Board of  
10 Election and Registration, Election Supervisor Ella  
11 Golden, retired, be bound over to the Attorney General's  
12 Office for violation of 21-2-403, time for opening and  
13 closing of polls, in that they failed to open 11 polls at  
14 7 A.M. on Election Day on June 9th, 2020.

15 MS. SULLIVAN: Is there anyone here from Liberty  
16 County?

17 MS. THOMAS: There is not.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: I'll make a motion to accept the  
19 recommendation from the investigator to refer this matter  
20 to the Attorney General's Office, if we have a second.

21 MR. MASHBURN: Second.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: Motion and a second, any further  
23 discussion?

24 MS. GHAZAL: Ms., --

25 MS. SULLIVAN: All in favor, please say aye. Oh, I'm

1       sorry. Please go ahead, Ms. Ghazal.

2               MS. GHAZAL: That's okay. Yes. Ms. Watson, can you  
3 tell me is there any evidence in the record with regard  
4 availability of sample ballots prior to voters selecting  
5 their ballot for the primary?

6               MS. WATSON: Yes. Sample ball -- sample ballots were  
7 posted.

8               MS. GHAZAL: Okay. Thank you very much.

9               MS. SULLIVAN: Is there any further discussion?

10              MS. THOMAS: We have L. Kelly Davis on the line.

11              MS. SULLIVAN: L. Kelly Davis, would you like to  
12 speak to this matter?

13              MS. THOMAS: You may speak. You're unmuted. Kelly  
14 Davis? You may speak now. You're unmuted. L. Kelly  
15 Davis, you're unmuted. You said that you would like to  
16 speak against this case. You can speak now.

17              MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. We have a motion and a second  
18 on the table. All in favor of the motion, please say aye.

19              THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

20              MS. SULLIVAN: Anyone opposed? Okay. That matter --  
21 that motion passes. The next case is 2020-095. Ms.  
22 Watson?

23              MS. WATSON: Yes. Sandra Russell filed a declaration  
24 of qualification documents to run for the office of  
25 superior court judge in Cochise County, Arizona. The

1 complainant challenged the residency of Sandra Russell in  
2 court partially due to Ms. Russell voting in DeKalb  
3 County. The complainant alleges that Ms. Russell gave  
4 testimony that she was a resident of Arizona for seven  
5 years prior to the hearing in 2020. Voter records  
6 indicate she voted in Georgia in May of 2016 and  
7 registered through Georgia Driver Services in May of --  
8 31st of 2018.

9 The investigation revealed Sandra Russell voted in  
10 Georgia during the November 4th, 2014 general election and  
11 May 24th, 2015 general primary. She also registered to  
12 vote through the Georgia Department of Driver Services on  
13 May 31st, 2018. Evidence to support that Sandra Russell  
14 did not have the qualifications to vote or register as a  
15 Georgia elector are Ms. Russell's April 6th, 2020  
16 declaration of qualification documents state she has  
17 resided in Cochise, Arizona for seven years before the  
18 election of November 3rd, 2020. In testimony from the  
19 Superior Court case in Arizona, Ms. Russell advised she  
20 moved to Arizona after her marriage in 2013, she  
21 considered Arizona her home, and she has the intent to  
22 remain in Arizona. Ms. Russell also advised she has been  
23 a resident of Arizona for 7.5 years. The Court found by a  
24 preponderance of the evidence that Ms. Russell was, in  
25 fact, a resident of Arizona prior to January 2016.

1 Ms. Russell advised if she did anything illegal, it  
2 was not intentional. She stated she has been a Georgia  
3 resident for 16 or 17 years until she moved to Arizona.  
4 Ms. Russell stated she has a law practice in Georgia and  
5 was going back and forth for cases. She advised she still  
6 has property in Georgia that she owns and pays property  
7 taxes on. She did not have a chance with all of her  
8 trials, going back and forth, having a family and  
9 everything else, she did not get around to registering to  
10 vote in Arizona. She stated she did not vote in both  
11 places. Ms. Russell advised she has voted for many years  
12 in Georgia. The main reason she voted is because she  
13 still had not obtained an Arizona driver's license. She  
14 did not have what she needed to register to vote in  
15 Arizona. Ms. Russell stated she does not have an excuse  
16 other than it was not a priority. She was dealing with a  
17 trial and a two-year-old at the time. Our recommendation  
18 is to refer to the AG's Office Sandra Russell for  
19 violation of the Georgia election code 21-2-561 and 21-2-  
20 571.

21 MS. THOMAS: And we have Mr. Rick Ryczek on the line  
22 representing Sandra Russell.

23 MR. RYCZEK: Good morning. This is attorney Rick  
24 Ryczek. I would -- I would respectfully the Board to  
25 either dismiss this case or we would ask for a letter --

1 letter of instruction to be issued. This is as close to -  
2 - if it did violate the law, it is as close to an innocent  
3 violation as you can get. She was -- and I'm sorry that  
4 we can't be together today. I'd prefer to be able to  
5 gesture and hand you documents, but I emailed the  
6 councilmembers that I could or the Board members that I  
7 could find email addresses for just to give you an idea of  
8 the nuance of what was going on in Ms. Russell's life at  
9 the time.

10 She had gotten married in August of 2013, and she --  
11 she shared her time between Georgia and Arizona from that  
12 time period forward until about 2016/'17 where she became  
13 -- it looks like August of 2016 where her daughter began  
14 school, and she remained full-time in Arizona. She -- she  
15 spent about half her time early on -- early in that period  
16 in Georgia -- or more than half her time in Georgia.  
17 Since she owned a home, since she had her car titled in  
18 Georgia, she felt that that was her residence at that time  
19 as well, and if you look at the -- the definition of  
20 residence, and I'm reading 21-2-2, now, she wasn't -- she  
21 wasn't researching the law at the time that she did this,  
22 but when you look back on it, even as a lawyer looking  
23 back on it, it's somewhat confusing. And -- and if we  
24 look at subsection 32, residence means domicile, she was  
25 domiciled in Georgia at the time that she voted. She

1 voted in the primary election in 2014, and she -- I'm  
2 sorry. She voted in the general election in 2014 and the  
3 primary election in 2016 at a time where she was spending  
4 at least half or more of her time in Georgia.

5 I'd like to -- I'd like the Board to consider very  
6 strongly that she never voted in more than one  
7 jurisdiction. There's no intent to get some additional  
8 right that she didn't think she otherwise had, so with --  
9 with respect to the voting allegation, we would ask the  
10 Board to dismiss this. I can't imagine that the Attorney  
11 General's Office would want to prosecute somebody that is  
12 doing everything she can to comply with the law. She's  
13 living half her time in one state and half her time in  
14 another state, and the same argument could be made if she  
15 had voted in Arizona, and we don't want to put voters  
16 trying to do the best they can to fulfill their civic  
17 obligations in a position where they -- they feel they  
18 could be in jeopardy, and that's what would happen if the  
19 Board were to forward this to the Attorney General's  
20 Office for prosecution.

21 With respect to the 2018 registration, we're -- we're  
22 perplexed by that. We don't know how she got registered.  
23 I'm -- I'm guessing it has something to do with when she  
24 renewed her driver's license. If that is the case, I  
25 don't know if she did it over her telephone or whether she

1 did it at a -- we just don't recall having -- how -- how  
2 she got her renewed driver's license, but there are boxes  
3 you have to check. Perhaps there's something you have to  
4 swear to, but it is our understanding, and it is her  
5 memory that she never re-registered to vote in Georgia in  
6 2018. We've submitted to the Board those emails we could  
7 find with her written registrations to vote, and those, I  
8 believe, were in 2013 and 2011. And I'm sorry, not  
9 registrations to vote, renewal of her driver's license in  
10 2011 and 2013, and both of those, she did not ask to  
11 register to vote. She specifically said I'm not  
12 registering to vote, so it's perplexing to us that she  
13 would have done that in 2018 and to trust this argument in  
14 support that she's not trying to register to vote, and if  
15 she did, it was in error, she did not, in fact, vote. She  
16 did vote in Arizona, where she was living full-time and  
17 had her domicile and residency in Arizona by 2018.

18 So based on that, we would respectfully request that  
19 the -- the Board of Elections either dismiss this case or  
20 issue a letter of instruction. This is a woman who is  
21 doing her best to fulfill her civic obligations. She was  
22 caught between living in two different places at the time  
23 -- at the same time, and if she did make a mistake,  
24 there's certainly no criminal intent, was not knowing, and  
25 she has a lot at stake. She's a practicing attorney. She

1 is barred in both Georgia and in Arizona. This came up  
2 because she was running for election, and her opponent,  
3 who I'm sure is on the call, is -- was upset with -- with  
4 the campaign and is seeking prosecution, and I would -- I  
5 would add that they are seeking prosecution or pushing for  
6 prosecution in Arizona as well for Ms. Russell having  
7 registered in Georgia. How they would have jurisdiction,  
8 I don't know, but somehow, the -- the complainant has  
9 pushed for that, and it'll be interesting to see -- see  
10 how they intend to try to prosecute a case in Arizona for  
11 conduct that occurred in Georgia. But the conduct that,  
12 in fact, occurred in Georgia is, I think, innocent  
13 conduct, a mistake.

14 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you.

15 MR. RYCZEK: -- wouldn't rise to the knowing level.  
16 Thank you.

17 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Mr. Ryczek. Ms. Russell  
18 did file a declaration in Arizona where she declared that  
19 she had been a citizen of the State of Arizona for 7 years  
20 before her election; is that accurate?

21 MR. RYCZEK: It's -- it's my understanding she said  
22 she was a resident. She resided -- I believe she said she  
23 resided in Arizona for that relevant time, which -- which  
24 she did, and she resided in Georgia during the relevant  
25 time as well, and if you look at the definitions in

1 Arizona and in Georgia, it -- it appears you can. You  
2 have the -- you reside in Arizona with the intent to stay,  
3 to remain, which she did. She wanted to remain in Arizona  
4 the rest of -- the rest of her life and maintain her  
5 marriage there. She was going back and forth from  
6 Georgia. She had to -- she had to have a physical  
7 presence in Georgia due to her daughter and the custody  
8 issues with her daughter, so she did -- when she was in  
9 Georgia, she -- she was also there in Georgia -- or here  
10 in Georgia, residing in Georgia.

11 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Ryczek. Do any  
12 of the other Board members have any questions for Mr.  
13 Ryczek? Okay. It appears that they do not. The motion  
14 is to bind Ms. Russell over to the Attorney General's  
15 Office for the violations listed in the complaint.

16 MR. MASHBURN: I move that we accept the  
17 recommendation.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion. Is there a second?

19 MS. LE: This is Anh Le. I'm going to second it with  
20 a comment to the attorney's point that the opponent is  
21 pushing for prosecution. We're binding it over because  
22 that's the correct thing to do under the facts, but we are  
23 -- we are not acting on behalf of or by influence of any  
24 opponent or any third party outside of the facts that were  
25 presented to us, so I second this motion.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second. Is  
2 there any further discussion? All in favor, please say  
3 aye.

4 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

5 MS. SULLIVAN: There are none opposed, and that  
6 motion passes. Moving on to SEB case number 2020-134.

7 MS. WATSON: In this case, Angela White-Davis  
8 reported two absentee ballots were returned to her office  
9 after verifying the voter was deceased. Investigators  
10 believe Mr. Robert Ranlett Shepherd [ph.] signed his oath  
11 envelope for the November 3rd, 2020 election. A  
12 comparison of his signature on the oath envelope was  
13 almost identical to the known signature of the decedent.  
14 The ballot was mailed to Mr. Shepherd on September 18th,  
15 2020. He did not die until August 6th, 2020. The ballot  
16 was not counted in the election.

17 Investigator -- investigators do not believe Herman  
18 Robert Jackson [ph.] signed his oath envelope for the  
19 November 3rd, 2020 election. The ballot was requested in  
20 May of 2020 and mailed September 18th, 2020. The oath  
21 envelope signature does not appear to match the known  
22 signature on file for this decedent. Signature appears to  
23 be a match to those of Glenda Jackson [ph.], the widow of  
24 Mr. Jackson. Glenda Jackson advised she filled it out for  
25 her husband as she knew how he wished to vote. She

1 advised if she knew it was such a big deal, she would have  
2 thrown it in the trash. Our recommendation is for Glenda  
3 Jackson to be referred to the Attorney General's Office  
4 for violation of 21-2-562.

5 MS. SULLIVAN: Is Ms. Jackson on the line? Okay.  
6 Who do we have that would like to speak to this case?

7 MS. THOMAS: Melanie Ray, you may now speak, and Ms.  
8 Jackson is on the line.

9 MS. SULLIVAN: The recommendation is to bind Ms.  
10 Jackson over to the Attorney General's Office regarding  
11 the allegations in this case.

12 MR. MASHBURN: I move that we accept the  
13 recommendation.

14 MS. SULLIVAN: And I'll second that motion. Is there  
15 any further discussion? All in favor, please say aye.

16 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

17 MS. SULLIVAN: Any opposed? And that motion passes.  
18 The next case is 2020-157, Spalding County.

19 MS. WATSON: On Election Day and the days that  
20 followed the November 3rd, 2020 election, we received many  
21 complaints regarding Spalding County. On November 3rd,  
22 Spalding County reported that none of the poll pads were  
23 able to create voter access cards for voters to be able to  
24 pull up their ballot on the ballot-marking devices. It  
25 was erroneously reported that a system update had occurred

1 the night before the election. A No Inc. representative  
2 investigated and advised that the data used to write the  
3 voter card was not imported correctly or was corrupted for  
4 Spalding. It was unknown as to if the issue occurred  
5 during the initial voter file upload or during the bulk of  
6 days. In order to correct the issue, No Inc. sent staff  
7 along with a Dominion employee to the voting locations in  
8 Spalding and brought down the information to correct the  
9 issue. Checklists to complete after the voter file is  
10 updated completed has now been provided to the County to  
11 try and catch this type of issue before Election Day and  
12 was in place for the January 2021 election. This  
13 checklist requires a voter access card be created and  
14 tested during preliminaries to verify the card is  
15 functioning properly.

16           Regardless of the cause of the issue that made the  
17 poll pads unavailable to create voter access cards, the  
18 primary breakdown on Election Day appears to be the direct  
19 result of lack of preparation and training by the Spalding  
20 County Elections Office, specifically failure to know and  
21 train for the new rule regarding emergency situations and  
22 the use of emergency ballots, also failure to train the  
23 poll workers on how to create ballots manually on the  
24 BMDs. Instead, the County fell back on the previous  
25 instructions for the prior, previous machines to go to

1 provisional ballots. This created issues when it was  
2 found that there were no emergency ballots at the poll  
3 locations, and there were very few provisional ballots at  
4 the polls resulting in individuals delivering unknown  
5 numbers of provisional ballots to poll locations, the  
6 polls not having enough envelopes to properly process the  
7 provisionals according to code. Some precincts were --  
8 with multiple combo codes were not verifying the voter was  
9 being issued the correct provisional ballot style  
10 according to the combo code they were entitled to vote.  
11 Due to the volume of provisionals at some precincts, the  
12 provisional containers were overflowing, resulting in  
13 makeshift containers being utilized that were not secured.

14 Spalding Election Board members were requested by  
15 Marcia Ridley to go to the precincts and pick up  
16 provisional ballots. This was done with a single person  
17 going to the polls to pick up provisionals and transport  
18 them alone back to the Elections Office. A container  
19 utilized in at least one situation was an open box that  
20 was not secured. There were not transfer forms completed  
21 to indicate how many were picked up from the precincts or  
22 turned over to the Elections Office. Some poll managers  
23 expressed they could not complete the recap sheet at the  
24 closing of polls since they had no idea how many  
25 provisionals were delivered during the day or how many

1 were picked up. Marcia Ridley, the Elections Supervisor,  
2 advised she made the decision to use provisionals, mainly  
3 because she states she was not trained on emergency  
4 ballots, and the poll workers were not trained either.

5 Leading up to the November election, the State  
6 provided multiple training opportunities to include  
7 conference calls every Tuesday. In March of 2020, a  
8 backup procedure guideline for the voting equipment which  
9 referenced the use of emergency ballots were provided to  
10 the County. These procedures were discussed on the March  
11 19th state-wide call and posted on Firefly, which county  
12 supervisors have access to. The backup procedures outline  
13 the system requires emergency ballots, that the precinct  
14 would use the emergency bin, and that emergency ballots  
15 are not provisional ballots. These procedures were also  
16 discussed on the August 7th state-wide call. The state-  
17 wide call report was posted on Firefly. Also, both posts  
18 -- reminders about these procedures were posted on the  
19 following dates: March 3rd, 2020, June 8th, 2020, August  
20 7th, 2020, and October the 30th of 2020. These procedures  
21 were also discussed during the election training.

22 PowerPoints and recordings of the webinars were posted on  
23 Firefly under webinars: March 19th, 2020, October 8th,  
24 2020, and December 8th, 2020.

25 Marcia Ridley requested information pertaining to the

1 emergency ballot rules and the location of where to find  
2 the new rules. This was in December, after the November  
3 election, indicating that she had not been familiar with  
4 the rules and procedures prior to the election.

5 Spalding was not the only county that had the voter  
6 access cards that would not load on Election Day. In one  
7 example, the elections supervisor had prepared a manual  
8 for the poll manager for emergency procedures, and they  
9 had completed training on the procedures in issuing  
10 emergency ballots and utilizing a ballot-marking device to  
11 manually load a ballot for the voter. They were able to  
12 orderly process voters until the poll pads were reset.

13 Over forty complaints were submitted regarding  
14 Spalding County. One that was reported in the news  
15 concerned a report of ballots in the dumpster behind the  
16 Election Office. This was found to be unfounded for  
17 ballots. The Sheriff's Office was notified and responded.  
18 The Sheriff's Office advised they collected the material  
19 that had already been gone through by the reporting  
20 individual. They took them back to the Sheriff's Office  
21 to be sorted. It was verified that documents originating  
22 from the Elections Office were in the dumpster. The  
23 documents contained birthdays, addresses, phone numbers,  
24 voter registration numbers, political party affiliations,  
25 and email addresses for some electors in Spalding County.

1 There were empty absentee ballot secrecy envelopes and  
2 blank empty outer envelopes. No ballots were found in the  
3 dumpster. The Sheriff's Office checked other dumpsters at  
4 all 18 polling locations to verify if there were any  
5 ballots or election materials and did not find any in the  
6 other locations. The voter's name, the month, the date of  
7 birth, and email addresses for registered voters would be  
8 a violation of 21-2-225(b).

9 Unsecured provisional containers at the senior center  
10 poll location, the poll manager advised that the  
11 provisional bag filled up, and they had to use an  
12 unsecured Rubbermaid container and a banker's box to place  
13 provisionals in. This would be a violation of SEB rule  
14 183-1-12-.18. It was also confirmed that the poll officer  
15 did not have elector Donald Crider sign a voter  
16 certificate prior to voting, a violation of 21-2-431(a).

17 Elector Selbsta [ph.] and her husband requested an  
18 absentee ballot that did not arrive. MyVoter page had the  
19 incorrect address listed with the incorrect city listed.  
20 She went to the Elections Office and filled out paperwork  
21 to correct the incorrect address and request an absentee  
22 ballot. Approximately two weeks later, she checked  
23 MyVoter page, and the address was still incorrectly  
24 listed. She went back to the office on October 14th and  
25 showed them it had not been changed, and no ballot

1 received. Annette Forty [ph.] at the Elections Office in  
2 Spalding reported that she changed the address on  
3 September 28th, 2020 and gave the information to another  
4 election employee, and she processed the request, and they  
5 were issued a ballot on October 28th, 2020. Election Net  
6 does not show that the ballot were -- was issued on  
7 October 28th. Failure to process the absentee ballots of  
8 Mr. and Mrs. Selbstra as requested after numerous attempts  
9 would be a violation of 21-2-431(a). As a result, the two  
10 individuals did not vote in the election.

11 Elec -- Elector Dunaway reported he had to vote on  
12 paper and was given the incorrect district race on his  
13 ballot. He wrote in the correct candidate of his choice  
14 on the incorrect ballot. No poll official was alerted to  
15 the incorrect district on the ballot. This would be a  
16 violation of incorrect ballot style.

17 Elector report -- reports that she went to vote at  
18 the First Assembly of God poll location and took her  
19 absentee ballot to surrender so she could vote in person.  
20 She reports the poll workers were confused about what to  
21 do. The elector also reports that she did not sign in and  
22 did not sign the poll pad or a voter certificate. She  
23 went to the ballot-marking device where the ballot was  
24 encoded, and she made her selections, printed the ballot,  
25 and scanned the ballot.

1           The poll manager reports that when the machine would  
2 not bring up the ballots from the voter access cards when  
3 they opened the poll, they were told to issue provisional  
4 ballots. She states that voters were to be first checked  
5 in on the poll pad so their identification could be --  
6 could be verified. Later, the office advised them how to  
7 pull up the ballot on the ballot-marking devices -- pull  
8 up the ballots for Precinct 19. The poll manager was  
9 familiar with the process of having the voter surrender  
10 the absentee ballot -- by mail ballot and/or sign an  
11 affidavit prior to voting. The poll manager states that  
12 they were not able to get the absentee mark off the poll  
13 pad so they could have the elector sign the poll pad.  
14 There is no documentation of a voter certificate for this  
15 elector, in violation of 21-2-431.

16           As to those who went out and uploaded provisional  
17 ballots from the poll locations while voting was still  
18 taking place, Marcia Ridley advised that Spalding County  
19 Election Board member Betty Bryant stated that as the  
20 provisional ballot bag -- bag started to fill that she  
21 went to go pick up the voted provisionals -- provisionals  
22 from the precincts. She picked up from the UGA precinct.  
23 The box was not secured or locked. The poll workers took  
24 their box of provisionals and dumped them into the box in  
25 the backseat of her car. The box Betty had in the car was

1 provided by Marcia. Betty advised that she was alone as  
2 she collected the ballots and that a sheriff's deputy was  
3 escorting her to the car. Betty Bryant advised that she  
4 did not countersign for the provisionals that she picked  
5 up. She then drove the box of voted provisionals to the  
6 Elections Office to turn them over to Marcia. No count  
7 was made of how many was delivered or signed by her. She  
8 obtained two more boxes and went to the Presbyterian  
9 Church precinct and the Roberts Fire Station precinct to  
10 pick up voted provisionals again. No paperwork was  
11 completed or signed for.

12 Ms. Bryant stated that she believed the other Board  
13 members were also picking up provisional ballots.  
14 Margaret Bentley advised she went to precincts to check on  
15 provisionals, and the container was not full, so she did  
16 not pick up. Mr. Jones [ph.] was contacted and stated he  
17 was serving as a Republican Party appointee at the  
18 Spalding Election Board and advised that he was following  
19 direction of Election Supervisor for his duties during the  
20 election but did not provide an answer to confirm or deny  
21 if he had picked up provisional ballots or not.

22 It was reported that poll manager Clay Davis did not  
23 have all voters to sign their names on poll pads or the  
24 voters' certificates. The poll manager stated that every  
25 voter did sign the poll pad or signed a voter certificate.

1       However, records indicate 20 people did not sign a poll  
2       pad or a voter certificate before voting.

3             An Athens-Clarke poll manager reported that poll pads  
4       were not charged, printers had not been filled with paper,  
5       three of the six voting machines were missing seals, voter  
6       cards were not able to be encoded, insufficient supplies  
7       of salmon-colored security envelopes, line monitor not  
8       trained, office staff not trained. The poll manager  
9       advised when they ran out of the salmon-colored security  
10      envelopes for the provisionals, they were told to just  
11      write the voter's information on the outside of the white  
12      envelopes. The poll manager advised she informed Marcia  
13      Ridley about the seal on the scanner but did not do so  
14      when it was first discovered.

15            When the poll opened and they discovered the voter  
16      access cards were not encoded, she was instructed to use  
17      provisionals but was only given a supply of 10 for the  
18      poll location. There was approximately 50 waiting in  
19      line. They requested additional provisionals and received  
20      them in approximately forty-five minutes but were not  
21      given enough salmon envelopes. The office instructed her  
22      to continue using the provisionals, write the voter  
23      information on the white envelope. They were supplied  
24      with approximately one thousand and then later in the day  
25      with approximately five hundred more. She received a text

1 message to explain how to encode the ballots straight on  
2 the ballot-marking device from Marcia. She states the  
3 text was not clear as to which code they were to use for  
4 their precinct. They were able to get the process started  
5 with the ballot-marking devices and clear the morning rush  
6 out by 10:30. It was 4 P.M. before the poll pads were  
7 fixed so that voter access cards could be encoded.

8 The poll manager also stated that the provisional  
9 ballot clerk did not know that the paper provisionals were  
10 combo code specific, so they were not ensuring that voters  
11 received the proper ballot they should have issued to  
12 them: violation of SEB rule 183-1-12-.11(2)(c) and 18  
13 counts of all 18 precincts were not supplied with 10  
14 percent of emergency ballots, SEB 183-1-12-.18(4)(c), when  
15 they failed to determine what ballot style to issue to the  
16 individual voters voting at this precinct.

17 An elector advised that when she went to vote at  
18 Eagle's Landing Church, she was told to place her ballot  
19 in a scanner bin which was unlocked and open. It was  
20 found that there was no poll pad signature for the elector  
21 Denise Muehr or a voter certificate. The ballot was  
22 brought up on the ballot-marking device, and she was  
23 allowed to vote. Credit for voting for the elector was  
24 entered by Spalding County on April 1st, 2021. Spalding  
25 County advised the page containing the list of voters that

1 voted at the precinct contained the elector's name, but  
2 the page of voters was inadvertently missed when they were  
3 entering credit for voting for the electors who signed a  
4 voter certificate. There was 20 that were listed on the  
5 list.

6 Poll manager at United Baptist Church reports voter  
7 access cards not encoding properly, provisional ballots  
8 delivered without any way to determine how many were  
9 delivered to the precinct in order to complete a recount  
10 sheet, voters not signing poll pad or voter certificate.  
11 The voters were verified on the poll pads and their names  
12 listed on the elector list. There were 286 that did not  
13 sign in on the poll pad or complete a voter certificate at  
14 that precinct.

15 Our recommendations are for the following to be  
16 referred to the Attorney General's Office: Spalding County  
17 Board of Elections and Voter Registration and former  
18 Elections Supervisor Marcia Ridley for violation of SEB  
19 rule 183-1-12-.11(2)(c)(d), the elections superintendent  
20 shall cause each polling place to have a sufficient amount  
21 of emergency paper ballots so that voting may continue  
22 uninterrupted if emergency circumstances render the  
23 electronic ballot-marking printers unusable, but if an  
24 emergency situation exists that makes voting on the  
25 electronic ballot-markers impossible or impractical, the

1 poll manager shall alert the elections superintendent that  
2 it's impossible. Filing a determination of an emergency  
3 situation is in -- in the description of the election  
4 superintendent. The types of events that may be  
5 considered emergencies are power outages, malfunctions  
6 causing a sufficient number of electronic ballot-markers  
7 to be unavailable for use, or waiting times longer than 30  
8 minutes. Training information, webinars, and the SEB  
9 rules were available for Spalding County Board of  
10 Elections Supervisor, former Elections Supervisor Marcia  
11 Ridley to learn the rules and proceed with using emergency  
12 ballots.

13 Also, Spalding County Board of Election and Voter  
14 Registration and former Elections Supervisor Marcia Ridley  
15 for 21-2-225(b), when they failed to ensure that election  
16 documents containing confidential voter information was  
17 properly disposed of, and for SEB rule 183-1-12-.18, also  
18 adding Bonnie Ann Arnett [ph.], provisional ballots was  
19 violated when the elections superintendent shall also  
20 provide a booth for voting provisionals in the enclosed  
21 space and a secure container in which the voted  
22 provisional ballot shall be placed. Spalding County Board  
23 of Election and Voter Registration, former Elections  
24 Supervisor Marcia Ridley, and Bonnie Ann Arnett for  
25 violation of 21-2-431(a) when Donald Crider reported he

1 did not sign his name before voting on November 3rd. This  
2 information was confirmed by Spalding County Board of  
3 Election employee Carla Rapp [ph.].

4 And Spalding County Board of Election and Voter  
5 Registration and former Election Supervisor Marcia Ridley  
6 for 21-2-431(a), when Triana and Richard Selbstra [ph.]  
7 made several attempts to obtain the mail-in ballot for  
8 Spalding County. Mr. and Mrs. Selbstra never received  
9 their mail-in ballots and were not able to vote. Spalding  
10 County Board of Election and Voter Registration and former  
11 Election Supervisor Marcia Ridley and Quincy Nelson [ph.]  
12 for violation of SEB rule 183-1-12-.18(3) when Abigail  
13 Locke [ph.] voted a provisional ballot in the UGA polling  
14 location and was not provided an inner or outer envelope.  
15 Spalding County Board of Election and Voter Registration  
16 and former Elections Supervisor Marcia Ridley, poll  
17 manager Bonnie Arnett for SEB rule 183-1-12-.18(3) when  
18 Mr. Dunaway was not issued the correct ballot containing  
19 District 2 Spalding County Commissioner race but was  
20 issued a District 1 ballot instead.

21 Spalding County Board of Election and Voter  
22 Registration and former Election Supervisor Marcia Ridley  
23 and poll manager Susan Autry [ph.] for 21-2-431(a), that  
24 every primary and election, each elector who desires to  
25 vote shall first execute a voter certificate. Glenda

1 Brumley did not sign her name on a poll pad or voter  
2 certificate before voting. Spalding County Board of  
3 Election and former Election Supervisor Marcia Ridley for  
4 21-2-215(i), when they failed to enter credit for voting  
5 in the November election for Glenda Brumley. Spalding  
6 County Board of Election and Voter Registration for 21-2-  
7 413(h), when Board members took possession of voted  
8 provisional ballots and transported them without a second  
9 election official being sworn or any transfer  
10 documentation.

11 Spalding County Board of Election and Voter  
12 Registration, former Election Supervisor Marcia Ridley for  
13 SEB rule 183-1-12-.11(2)(c), 18 counts, when all 18  
14 precincts were not supplied with ten percent emergency  
15 ballots. Spalding County Board of Election and Voter  
16 Registration and former Election Supervisor Marcia Ridley  
17 and Susan Summerland [ph.] for SEB rule 183-1-12-  
18 .18(4)(c), as they failed to determine what ballot style  
19 provisional ballot to issue to the individual voters  
20 voting at the precinct on November 3rd, 2020. Spalding  
21 County Board of Election and Voter Registration and former  
22 Election Supervisor Marcia Ridley and Clay Davis for 21-2-  
23 431(a), 20 counts. At every primary and election, each  
24 elector who desires to vote shall first execute a voter  
25 certificate. And Spalding County Board of Election and

1 Voter Registration, former Election Supervisor Marcia  
2 Ridley, Julia Howard [ph.] for a violation of 21-2-431(a),  
3 286 counts. At every primary and election, each elector  
4 who desires to vote shall first execute a voter  
5 certificate.

6 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you for that presentation, Ms.  
7 Watson. Would Fulton County like to address -- I mean,  
8 Spalding County like to address these allegations?

9 MS. THOMAS: Yes. First, we have Stephanie Windham  
10 on the phone. You may speak.

11 MS. WINDHAM: Good morning. This is Stephanie  
12 Windham. I am the county attorney for Spalding County,  
13 and I would like to say that these measures -- these  
14 matters will be completely rectified by our next election.  
15 We have a new Election Supervisor, and we also have an  
16 entirely new Board of Elections starting in December. The  
17 December member is our oldest member, our most senior  
18 member on the Board at this time. The other four have  
19 been appointed in -- as of May and June of this year.

20 I certainly cannot argue that there were many, many  
21 failures at our November 3rd election. Those began with  
22 the -- the situation where none of the machines worked at  
23 7 A.M., and this was at all precincts, all 18 precincts in  
24 Spalding County. That exacerbated everything that  
25 happened next. Our -- I'm not sure if Marcia Ridley is on

1 the line. I do know that I have Clay Davis and Margaret  
2 Bentley who would like to speak. There were -- we can't  
3 deny that hundreds of voters did not sign poll pads.

4 Our main issue is -- was a lack of training on  
5 emergency ballots. Our Election Supervisor did not train  
6 on emergency ballots, and therefore, none of our poll  
7 managers or poll workers were trained on emergency  
8 ballots. I believe any of our poll managers would have  
9 determined that the situation they faced on the morning of  
10 November the 3rd was indeed an emergency. These poll  
11 managers have done the best they could with what they had.  
12 They made several calls throughout the day, nearly -- I'm  
13 aware of several poll managers who made several calls  
14 throughout the day to the Elections Office. Some were  
15 given conflicting information, and I -- I would ask that  
16 these poll managers be given the consideration of letters  
17 of instruction. There are many experienced poll managers  
18 that are -- are named in these allegations, and they were  
19 doing as they were told as they were trained.

20 The -- the chain of custody issues, those Board  
21 members who picked up those provisional ballots would tell  
22 you that they were alone and that in some cases the ballot  
23 containers were not secure. These Board members were also  
24 doing as instructed based on the fact that the entire day  
25 was chaos, and these Board members would also appreciate

1 letters of instruction in these matters, as they were  
2 simply doing as they were asked to do and in an effort to  
3 be helpful and to make sure that every person's vote to  
4 count on November the 3rd.

5 I am somewhat at a loss as to say any more other than  
6 to reiterate that we do have a new Election Supervisor.  
7 She started on Monday, and it is her intention and -- she  
8 has begun already to inventory. She has been in touch  
9 with the Secretary of State about recertifying our  
10 machines and our election server. The new Board is fully  
11 aware of all the issues from the November 3rd election,  
12 and it is their primary goal to provide adequate training  
13 for everyone involved: poll workers, Board members, the  
14 Election Supervisor, everyone in the Elections Office in  
15 the future. That training has already started with a  
16 visit from our liaison Robin Carr, who spent the day with  
17 us training on Senate Bill 202, also answering our various  
18 questions. Robin has been a wonderful source for us, as  
19 has Sarah Beck, and we appreciate the Secretary of State  
20 providing those resources for us. It is the Spalding  
21 County Board of Election's main goal -- in fact, their own  
22 goal is to put on a free, fair, and transparent election  
23 in November of 2021. Thank you, and I do know that Clay  
24 Davis is here to speak, and I believe that Margaret  
25 Bentley is also available to speak.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: If he would like to speak, please go  
2 ahead.

3 MR. DAVIS: This is Clay Davis. Thank you for  
4 allowing me to speak considering how busy you all are. I  
5 was a poll manager at Precinct 21 and have been a poll  
6 manager for five plus years, so I think I understood the  
7 system beforehand. I'm a retired Army officer and known  
8 as a rule-follower. I believe strongly that my voting  
9 team would be classified as rule-followers as well. This  
10 is exactly why I selected them for their moral and  
11 character. The investigation found that twenty voters in  
12 my precinct did not sign either the poll pads or voter  
13 certificates. I and my team both understood how important  
14 it is to have those signatures. As it turns out, I cannot  
15 refute anything on that investigation. We were basically  
16 told when we turned in the machines that we would not be  
17 able to get back into those machines, and after the  
18 documentation was provided to me, I was once again told  
19 that I would not be able to validate any information in  
20 those machines.

21 Normally, I would stand before you and say that I  
22 take total responsibility. This was human error. The  
23 computer shows that there were no voter signatures on the  
24 poll pads, but that's not exactly what I believe happened  
25 and what my team thinks happened.

1           If you'll allow me a couple of minutes, I'll try to  
2 walk through. When the system went down, one of them -- I  
3 had two poll pads. One of my poll pads would simply  
4 reboot and then reboot again and then reboot again every  
5 time it got up to where we were able to use it. The other  
6 poll pad would reboot a couple of times -- or three times  
7 an hour. We were able to validate every person who came  
8 through by using that poll pad. Sometimes, when it  
9 rebooted, we had to start that voter back through. Other  
10 times, we did not. Things like the scanner not reading  
11 the ballots at all caused us a situation that was similar.

12           I want to tell you that I do not have a high level of  
13 confidence that this was a human error. I believe that  
14 the poll pads, when they rebooted over the entire day,  
15 that twenty signatures were lost. I know that's hard to  
16 believe with our reliance on technology, but with the poll  
17 pads rebooting routinely, I think that those were lost.  
18 My team feels strongly that they checked every signature  
19 to make sure that it was there. They understood how  
20 important it was. We understood when this happened that  
21 this was going to be a seriously looked at situation, so  
22 at the end of the day, after the polls closed, we hand  
23 counted every ballot. We validated that information  
24 against the poll pads and the ballot-marking devices to  
25 make sure that the numbers matched up. There was a slight

1 difference between a card that wasn't read properly and  
2 had to go back through, if you understand that whole  
3 system. We are absolutely certain that every ballot that  
4 was cast was cast by a registered voter in our precinct.  
5 I want to say thank you for taking the time to listen to  
6 one poll manager's view of how this thing happened. Thank  
7 you.

8 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Mr. Davis. I believe we  
9 have one additional person who would like to address the  
10 Board.

11 MS. WINDHAM: I believe that's --

12 MS. THOMAS: Yes. Is she -- is she on the line with  
13 you?

14 MS. WINDHAM: She is not here with me, but she was  
15 going to be on -- on the call.

16 MS. THOMAS: Okay. I do not see her listed on the  
17 call, but we do have some other people that would like to  
18 speak.

19 MS. WINDHAM: Okay.

20 MS. THOMAS: So Ms. Ashley Giles [ph.], you may  
21 speak.

22 MS. GILES: Can you hear me?

23 MS. THOMAS: Yes.

24 MS. GILES: Hello? Okay.

25 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes, we can hear you.

1 MS. GILES: Does this have -- does this have anything  
2 to do with -- I was not there on Election Day. However, I  
3 was there on the 4th, when they were going through their  
4 provisional ballots. They had stacks and stacks where we  
5 were locked out. Does that have anything to do with that?  
6 There was a case number that was given over to --

7 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes. That is include -- that is  
8 included in the -- in our investigation report.

9 MS. GILES: Okay. Do you -- do you guys have the  
10 video of that? Because I can show you, I mean, like, how  
11 many ballots there were in these envelopes coming out. It  
12 was -- it was tons of them. I asked the Secretary of  
13 State's investigator if he needed the videos. He said he  
14 would meet up with me to get the videos. However, that --  
15 that never happened.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. So you wanted to let us  
17 know that you have videos of --

18 MS. GILES: I do.

19 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you. Is there anything  
20 else you wanted to say regarding those allegations at this  
21 time?

22 MS. GILES: I was wondering every polling place has a  
23 box, and I was just wondering if copies of the poll  
24 manager's book is also available online, if it's available  
25 to all of these people, you know, working -- working the

1 polls that day?

2 MS. SULLIVAN: I do not know the specifics of this  
3 matter. I can tell you that this case is going to be  
4 referred to the Attorney General's Office, and there will  
5 be opportunity for further investigation into all the  
6 allegations that were presented.

7 MS. GILES: Okay. Thank you.

8 MS. THOMAS: And next, we have Donald Crider. You  
9 may speak now.

10 MR. CRIDER: Yes. Can you hear me?

11 MS. THOMAS: Yes.

12 MR. CRIDER: Okay. Yes. My name is Don Crider, and  
13 I'm just a local concerned citizen. I think the  
14 investigator did a great job summarizing the -- what I  
15 would consider multiple issues surrounding this election,  
16 and everything there would be an accurate description of  
17 what, you know, the Spalding County voter experience was.  
18 Essentially, in my opinion, everything the Election  
19 Supervisor could possibly do wrong, she did wrong, and  
20 with all due respect to Ms. Windham, I would hope -- I  
21 would hope that these issues are corrected prior to the  
22 next election, but in my opinion, there has to be full  
23 accountability for this past election. What the  
24 leadership did in this election goes beyond lack of  
25 training. It was a complete breakdown, and I fully

1 support this matter being referred to the Attorney  
2 General's Office if we want voters to have confidence in  
3 Spalding County elections. And without voter  
4 certificates, I don't even know how these election results  
5 were certified, so I fully support moving this matter to  
6 the Attorney General's Office.

7 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you for your comments. Next?

8 MS. THOMAS: Next, we have Christine Hallman.

9 MS. HALLMAN: Hello. Can you hear me?

10 MS. THOMAS: Yes.

11 MS. HALLMAN: I'm Christine Hallman. I live in  
12 Griffin, Georgia. I vote at Precinct 19. My husband and  
13 I were the second and third people in line for the  
14 presidential election at Precinct 19. We walked in. We  
15 gave them our driver's licenses. They gave us the little  
16 yellow voting card. We went to the machines, but the  
17 machines were down. We had to wait for an hour for them  
18 to figure out what to do. They couldn't get anybody in to  
19 fix the machines, so they finally gave us the provisional  
20 ballots to complete, but that was quite confusing. They  
21 didn't have pens, different things, to help with that, but  
22 we did get to vote on the provisional ballot. They kept  
23 that little yellow computer card that contained our  
24 personal information. We were concerned about that. We  
25 were told that the computers did finally come back online

1 around 10 o'clock.

2 I called on 11/8/2020 to verify that our ballots were  
3 counted. Mary of the Spalding County Elections Board  
4 verified that they had not been counted, but they would be  
5 counted that day. She took my name and number and said  
6 that they would call me back with verification when it was  
7 counted. Well, I called back on 11/11 because I never  
8 received the call. Mary stated they were not allowed to  
9 give me the information, so I called Brad Raffensperger's  
10 office to file a grievance. I've also called Joy  
11 Ferguson's office as well. Raffensperger's office stated  
12 that Spalding County was required to give me the  
13 information, and they were going to have someone to call  
14 me back from their office. I did not receive that call  
15 back.

16 However, Raffensperger's office told me that MyVoter  
17 page, the verification section, was grayed out and that my  
18 husband's was too. They stated there was no reason for  
19 that to be grayed out. I called Spalding County back and  
20 stated that I had called Raffensperger's office and filed  
21 a grievance, and they stated that Spalding County was  
22 required to give me the information regarding my vote  
23 count. Mary had Carla give me a call. She stated that  
24 mine and my husband's votes were counted. I asked why our  
25 screens were grayed out. She stated that when they

1 counted the votes, they went in and grayed them out, but  
2 they would later update the information. However, they  
3 never updated that information. My information on MyVoter  
4 page only changed when I went in for the early voting for  
5 the runoff election. Then, the information showed that I  
6 had done the early voting for the runoff, but then later  
7 on, that was grayed out as well a few days later.

8 I'm concerned that my vote didn't count in the  
9 presidential election or the early voting for the runoff  
10 because I just have no confidence in this election process  
11 as it was -- went on in Spalding County. I did receive a  
12 call from Raffensperger's office from an investigator that  
13 sa -- he stated to me that my vote did count. He called a  
14 few months back, and -- but he could not verify who I  
15 voted for. That was my first concern.

16 The second concern is when we were standing there for  
17 an hour waiting on them to figure out how to get the  
18 machines up and working and what was going on or what they  
19 were going to do with us, I asked the poll worker at  
20 Precinct 19 about them being connected to the Internet.  
21 The man stated they were not, but they had yellow ethernet  
22 cords plugged into the machines. When we went for the  
23 early voting of the runoff election, all the wires at that  
24 voting precinct near the senior center, they were all  
25 covered in black tape everywhere. You could no longer see

1 what color wires they were, and I found that a concern as  
2 well.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. Yeah. Thank you, Ms.  
4 Hallman. We do have a -- we do have a listing of all of  
5 your allegations within this, and this matter is going to  
6 be referred to the Attorney General's Office for further  
7 instructions, so in the interest of time, if we --

8 MS. HALLMAN: That was all I had.

9 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you so much.

10 MS. HALLMAN: Uh huh. Thank you.

11 MS. THOMAS: We have one more person. Denise Muehr,  
12 you may speak now.

13 MS. MUEHR: Yes. Thank you. I also voted in  
14 Spalding, and here is my concern. Well, first, I want to  
15 say I was very impressed with at the beginning of this,  
16 you said a prayer, brought God in. You said a Pledge of  
17 Allegiance. You brought country in. I respect that, and  
18 I love that. I also respect that you have this platform  
19 where people can err their grievances or problems.

20 My problem with this whole thing is as this last  
21 lady, the last couple of people, stated there were a lot  
22 of things wrong with this election, and I, for one, -- my  
23 husband and I were there before 7 A.M. We never left  
24 there until 11:30 A.M., so meanwhile, what went on while  
25 we were there during that first hour, a lady came out and

1 told us that the machines were down because there was a  
2 software update the night before, and then all the  
3 machines were down. Now, that, to me, wasn't right, and  
4 that's what made me very suspicious, and so when we went  
5 into the whole thing, I was kind of questioning how this  
6 was going to go.

7 At one point, they let us inside because it was cold  
8 inside, and we were there for so long, and at one point,  
9 they said if you're going to vote the provisional ballot,  
10 go in this line, but if you're going to wait for the  
11 machines to be up, then go in this room. Well, we decided  
12 we wanted to vote no matter what, so we decided we would  
13 stay in the line for provisional ballots, but if the  
14 machines were up by the time that we got to the front,  
15 than we preferred the machine. By the time we got up to  
16 the front, there were, like, two or three rows of chairs  
17 where we kind of, you know, played musical chairs until we  
18 could get up to the lady signing us in, and my husband and  
19 I both, one by one, showed our license, signed in. Sharon  
20 Solo [ph.] was the person sitting there, signing us in,  
21 and then, we were not given an individual card the way we  
22 normally are to use in the machine.

23 There were only two machines working by the time we  
24 got up there, and they inserted the card, and my ballot  
25 printed out. I was never offered a provisional. My

1 ballot printed out of the machine. I carried it over to  
2 the scanner. The scanner wasn't working. I was just  
3 asked to drop it in the bin. Well, that just -- all of  
4 that just didn't seem right. Even though, you know, I  
5 knew several of the people there, and, you know, had no,  
6 you know, question to doubt, you know, the integrity of  
7 any of that, but the whole thing was just not right.

8 And so when I went home, I wrote an email to the  
9 Secretary of State, and I hadn't heard back for a while,  
10 but meanwhile, there was another important election coming  
11 up, the one for the Senate, and before that election,  
12 because that was a highly important election to people, my  
13 husband and I received in the mail an official voter audit  
14 stated how we voted since 2014, that we did or did not  
15 vote, and it said on here -- well, both my husband and I -  
16 - I have the letters in front of me. Both my husband and  
17 I, it said we didn't vote in the 2020 election. Well, we  
18 most certainly did. My husband was so upset. He went to  
19 the voter office in Griffin and talked to the people  
20 there. They told him that his vote counted, and because  
21 of the upcoming election and so on, they just didn't have,  
22 you know, all the, you know, updated info or something.  
23 Well, I did not go that day.

24 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you.

25 MS. MUEHR: Well, wait. One more thing, please.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you.

2 MS. MUEHR: Then, I received a call from the  
3 investigator telling me that he didn't understand what  
4 happened because according to the records, my husband  
5 voted, but I didn't. Now, that's not right. You know, he  
6 went down to complain, and all of a sudden, they switch it  
7 over that he voted, and then, I didn't go, so they're  
8 saying I didn't vote. This isn't right, and if -- if you  
9 folks want people to stop doubting what went on, you need  
10 a forensic audit. You should be pushing for that because  
11 there are many people who think all of this is wrong, and  
12 if you really care about transparency, you will push for  
13 that because there are many people who are not happy with  
14 the way all of this went. And I please beg you, please  
15 consider that. Thank you.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Muehr. I think I speak  
17 on behalf -- that's all -- I think I can certainly speak  
18 on behalf of the Board that just the sheer volume and  
19 number of mistakes and allegations in this case is -- is  
20 simply overwhelming. Thank you, Ms. Windham, for being  
21 here, and hopefully, Spalding County is on the direct --  
22 correct path to direct all of these -- all of these errors  
23 so that we will have a -- the next election will be a  
24 smooth one. I believe that the motion in this case is  
25 going to be refer this to the Attorney General's Office

1 for consideration, and, in fact, I will make that motion.

2 MR. MASHBURN: Second.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: And there is a second. Is there any  
4 further discussion, or would any of the other Board  
5 members like to make any comments at this time? I think  
6 so my motion is to accept the recommendation of the  
7 investigator to refer all of this, all of the Respondents  
8 and matters to the Attorney General's Office. We have a  
9 second. If there's no further discussion, all in favor,  
10 please say aye.

11 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

12 MS. SULLIVAN: And there are none opposed, so that  
13 motion passes. It is 12:22. We're going to go ahead and  
14 take a 35-minute break. At the same time, we are going to  
15 go into executive session for discussion of pending  
16 litigation. We will come back at 1 o'clock, if that's all  
17 right with all the Board members. Okay.

18 MS. LE: Do you need a motion?

19 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes. We need a motion to exit in --  
20 to go into executive session.

21 MR. MASHBURN: So move.

22 MS. LE: Second.

23 MS. SULLIVAN: All in favor, please say by -- saying  
24 aye.

25 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. We will reconvene at 1  
2 o'clock out of executive session. Thank you.

3 (Meeting break)

4 (Meeting resumes)

5 MS. SULLIVAN: Good afternoon. It is 1 o'clock, and  
6 we will reconvene the State Election Board. I will make a  
7 motion that we exit out of executive session.

8 MR. MASHBURN: Second.

9 MS. SULLIVAN: We've got a motion and a second. All  
10 in favor, please say aye.

11 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

12 MS. SULLIVAN: And we are back into regular session.  
13 Next on our agenda is case number 2020-165, Greene County.  
14 Ms. Watson?

15 MS. WATSON: The Greene County Board of Elections and  
16 Registration received in November of 2020 ballots from  
17 Greene County voter Alyssa Shonte Miller [ph.] that was  
18 placed in the June 2020 general election primary envelope.  
19 In reviewing the voter's account, the Elections Office  
20 found that no ballot had been sent to the voter for the  
21 November 2020 election. Respondent failed to cooperate  
22 with the investigation. It is unknown how the Respondent  
23 was able to secure an absentee ballot for the November  
24 2020 general election. The Greene County Elections Office  
25 did not count the Respondent's ballot in the November 2020

1 election due to the discrepancy. Other than the absentee  
2 ballot sent to the Respondent at her address of record on  
3 May 26th, 2020, no other absentee ballots in the  
4 Respondent's name or any name of any other voter was  
5 mailed to the Respondent's address for the November 2020  
6 general election. Alyssa Miller stated that whatever came  
7 in the mail, came in the mail. Our recommendation is to  
8 refer Alyssa Shonte Miller to the Attorney General's  
9 Office for a violation of 21-2-384(c)(1).

10 MS. SULLIVAN: We have no one here to speak on behalf  
11 of this case. Do any of the Board members have questions  
12 for Ms. Watson? The recommendation is to refer the case  
13 matter to the Attorney General's Office.

14 MR. MASHBURN: I move that we accept the  
15 recommendation.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: I'll second that motion. Any further  
17 discussion? All in favor, please say aye.

18 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

19 MS. SULLIVAN: And there are none opposed. Case  
20 number 2020-170, Bartow County?

21 MS. WATSON: On November the 9th, 2020, we received a  
22 complaint regarding unsolicited mailed absentee ballots  
23 during the Bartow County 2020 general election. According  
24 to the complaint, a couple received multiple unsolicited  
25 absentee ballots in the mail, and a deceased voter

1 received a letter in the mail thanking him for his vote.  
2 An interview with the complainant revealed the documents  
3 that he received in the mail were more than likely  
4 applications for absentee ballots and not actual issued  
5 mail ballots due to the fact that the description of what  
6 was received did not match what an absentee ballot looks  
7 like.

8           Regarding the deceased voter who received a letter  
9 thanking him for voting, the complainant did not provide  
10 the voter's name. He was referring to a coworker who  
11 mentioned that they had saw it in the letter. The  
12 complainant did not provide any information pertaining to  
13 the thank you letter. Thank you letters were not mailed  
14 by the Elections Office. Our recommendation is to dismiss  
15 the cases. There was no allegation substantiated.

16           MS. SULLIVAN: There is no one here to speak on this  
17 case.

18           MR. MASHBURN: I move to accept the recommendation  
19 and dismiss the case.

20           MS. LE: Second.

21           MS. SULLIVAN: Any further discussion? All in favor,  
22 please say aye.

23           THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

24           MS. SULLIVAN: And there's none opposed. Case number  
25 2020-184, Cobb County.

1 MS. WATSON: Allegation one, Candace Fisher [ph.]  
2 alleges that while she was a credentialed voter review  
3 panel member, she observed during the voter review panel  
4 there were times between October 28th and October 29th  
5 when no Republican representatives were present, and the  
6 room where voter review panel was being conducted was not  
7 secure. There were many boxes stacked 8 to 10 feet high  
8 adjacent to the door. There was not -- no security at the  
9 door. There was no supervisor of the boxes. An unknown  
10 adult male was seen reaching into one of the boxes.

11 Allegation two, complainant Bailey Bernard [ph.]  
12 advised that they requested an absentee ballot which did  
13 not arrive. They later received notice that the ballot  
14 was rejected because of a signature mismatch. They  
15 advised that they did not submit the ballot indicated by  
16 the Board.

17 The mother of Matthew Maloof [ph.] advised that she  
18 dropped her son's absentee ballot into the drop box and  
19 went to the office on Friday, October the 30th. She  
20 checked online to confirm the following Wednesday and was  
21 unable to do so. She later was told that it was rejected  
22 for being delivered after the 7 P.M. deadline on Tuesday,  
23 11/3. She additionally advised that the Georgia Voter  
24 Hotline said her son never requested an absentee ballot.

25 Megan Harris [ph.] alleges that Shannon Maloy lived

1 in Massachusetts and voted in Georgia. Salleigh Grubbs  
2 alleges food trucks were at the Cobb County Board of  
3 Elections on October 27th and were not nonpartisan.  
4 Russell White [ph.] alleges that he never received his  
5 absentee ballot. He advised that he has been getting  
6 different answers from people with Cobb elections.

7 Investigation revealed the list of representatives  
8 for the review panel was provided, showing adequate  
9 representation. There was also alternates available if a  
10 representative did not show up. As long as two parties  
11 were present, they continued: Republican, Democrat, and  
12 Libertarian. The building was equipped with locks,  
13 cameras, and an alarm system. Near the rear of the  
14 building, the assembled boxes and stacked the empty boxes  
15 up for use. There were election employees assigned to the  
16 doors to check in those on the voter review panel. The  
17 boxes the complainant referred to were empty boxes.

18 The ballot for Mr. Bernard was not cancelled due to  
19 signature mismatch. It was cancelled when it was returned  
20 as undeliverable from the Post Office in a letter sent to  
21 the requester. The ballot that was requested by Mr.  
22 Maloof was for the June election. The June election  
23 ballot was voted and deposited in the drop box for the  
24 November election. The ballot was rejected, as it was  
25 received after the election June deadline.

1           It was confirmed that the elector Shannon Maloy moved  
2 from Cherokee County, Georgia to Massachusetts in  
3 September of 2020. She voted in the November 2020  
4 election, as well as the January 2021 election, in  
5 Georgia. The elector advised that she believed she had a  
6 few months to change her residency for voting.

7           As for the food trucks, no documentation of this  
8 violation was provided or could be located. Cobb County  
9 Elections advised to the knowledge the trucks that were at  
10 the poll locations complied with the state laws and rules.  
11 The elector did request an absentee ballot that was issued  
12 and mailed on September 18th, 2020 and then cancelled at  
13 the request of the elector on October 18th, 2020, and a  
14 second absentee ballot was issued and mailed. No absentee  
15 ballot was received back from the elector.

16           Our recommendation is to dismiss all allegations  
17 except allegation four. In reference to allegation four,  
18 we recommend Shannon Marie Maloy be referred to the  
19 Attorney General's Office for violation of 21-2-571, and I  
20 believe that she has attorney Bruce Maloy that is  
21 representing her.

22           MS. THOMAS: Yes, and he is on the line. You may  
23 speak now.

24           MR. MALOY: Good afternoon. Are you able to hear me  
25 okay?

1 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes.

2 MR. MALOY: I appreciate this opportunity, and Ms.  
3 Shannon Maloy is also on the call today. This has been a  
4 misunderstanding. I'm going to walk you through the facts  
5 of the situation. I've sent each of you a letter that  
6 outlines what our position about this is, but Shannon  
7 Maloy was born and raised in Georgia, graduated from high  
8 school in Georgia, where she was an outstanding student,  
9 and she attended Duke University and graduated from Duke  
10 in 2019. She is a pre-med major, and her intent all along  
11 was to return to Georgia and attend the Medical College of  
12 Georgia as an in-state resident paying in-state tuition,  
13 so maintaining her residence was something that she paid  
14 attention to.

15 There is a factual misunderstanding in the  
16 investigator's presentation. When she was called on the  
17 phone and asked the question when did you move to  
18 Cambridge, she said September 2020. She moved to  
19 Massachusetts in September of 2019, and the reason she  
20 moved to Massachusetts was -- believe it or not -- she  
21 didn't feel that a degree from Duke University was enough  
22 to enable her to apply to medical school. I'm glad I went  
23 to graduate school 46 years ago. She wanted to enhance  
24 her resume, and so she did an internship at a pediatric  
25 hospital in Boston, an outstanding pediatric hospital, in

1 order to be able to improve her chances of getting --  
2 getting into medical school. So she went for the purpose  
3 of this internship, and her intention was to enroll at the  
4 Medical College of Georgia so that she would be starting  
5 next month in September of 2021.

6 So the statute says under section 5 if a person  
7 removes to another state with the intention of remaining  
8 there an indefinite time and making such state the  
9 person's place of residence, such person shall be  
10 considered to have lost their residence, notwithstanding  
11 the person may intend to return at some indefinite future  
12 period. Well, this was not an indefinite future period.  
13 It had a very definite date attached to it.

14 But unfortunately, COVID intervened. Taking the  
15 medical college admissions test became very logistically  
16 difficult, and so in February of 2021, Ms. Maloy took a  
17 job with a healthcare company in Massachusetts. After  
18 she'd been there a couple of months and still all the  
19 problems with COVID, she decided that she would stay  
20 there. So in April of 2021 for the first time, she gave  
21 up on the idea of going to medical school and decided to  
22 stay in Massachusetts. She changed her driver's license.  
23 She was then automatically registered to vote in  
24 Massachusetts as part of that process. Since then, she  
25 has withdrawn -- she has notified the voter registrar that

1 she is no longer a Georgia resident. She never voted in  
2 Massachusetts. She was never registered to vote in  
3 Massachusetts. She never had a Massachusetts driver's  
4 license, and she had every intent of coming back to the  
5 State of Georgia at a specific time for a specific reason.

6 So this is a circumstance, you know, this isn't at  
7 all like the woman from Arizona that you had earlier. I  
8 mean, one, she's a lawyer. Two, she ran for public office  
9 in Arizona. This is just a student who plans to come back  
10 here after furthering her education out of state, and the  
11 only appropriate thing for this Board to do is to dismiss  
12 this case. If you send this over to the Attorney  
13 General's Office, I would suggest to you, you're just  
14 really not doing your job, and you're kicking the pan down  
15 the road. Shannon Maloy didn't do one thing wrong, and,  
16 frankly, she deserves to be vindicated by this Board.  
17 Thank you.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Mr. Maloy. Do any of the  
19 Board members have any questions for Mr. Maloy or Ms.  
20 Watson?

21 MS. GHAZAL: This is Sara Ghazal here. Mr. Maloy,  
22 can you re -- go through the timeline again when Ms. Maloy  
23 accepted the internship, and how long she had initially  
24 intended to remain in Massachusetts?

25 MR. MALOY: Sure. She began the internship at the

1 hospital in Boston in September of 2019. She had  
2 graduated from Duke University earlier that year, and so  
3 her original goal was that she would have started at the  
4 Medical College of Georgia in September of 2021, next  
5 month. She took a different job in February of 2021, and  
6 it's after having that job for a couple of months that she  
7 realized she really liked that and has at the point in  
8 time, which is around April of 2021, decided that, you  
9 know, I'm not going to go to law -- I'm not going to go to  
10 medical school. I'm going to stick with this job. Maybe  
11 I'll go to medical school some time in the future.

12 MS. GHAZAL: Thank you.

13 MS. SULLIVAN: Ms. Watson, was the -- does the  
14 investigation reflect that the investigator was aware that  
15 Ms. Maloy was a student.

16 MS. WATSON: No. The report indicates that she  
17 advised that she moved to Cambridge, Massachusetts in  
18 September of 2020 and due to the closeness of the election  
19 decided to keep her Georgia residence. We were not -- I  
20 was not aware from the report that she was a student  
21 intending to return.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: With this information that she was a  
23 student, would that change your recommendation?

24 MS. WATSON: Yes. Based on that recommendation, I  
25 would recommend that we dismiss.

1 MR. MALOY: And just to clarify one more time, Ms.  
2 Maloy was answering the question correctly. She moved to  
3 Cambridge, Massachusetts in September 2020. If she'd been  
4 asked the question when did you move to Massachusetts,  
5 then the answer would have been September 2019.

6 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you.

7 MR. MASHBURN: So this is Matt Mashburn. Just to  
8 recap it, she grew up in Georgia, right?

9 MR. MALOY: Yes, correct.

10 MR. MASHBURN: She went to high school in Georgia.

11 MR. MALOY: Yes. Honors graduate, AJC Student of the  
12 Year.

13 MR. MASHBURN: Has she ever voted in a state other  
14 than Georgia?

15 MR. MALOY: No.

16 MR. MASHBURN: That's all I have.

17 MS. SULLIVAN: What's the will of the Board?

18 MS. LE: I move to accept Ms. Frances' recommendation  
19 as amended, that is to dismiss.

20 MS. SULLIVAN: I'll second that motion. We have a  
21 motion and a second. Is there any further discussion?  
22 All in favor, please say aye.

23 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

24 MS. SULLIVAN: And there's none opposed. The case is  
25 dismissed. Thank you, Mr. Maloy. The next case is 2020-

1 194, Floyd County.

2 MS. WATSON: Yes. Our office opened this  
3 investigation after the state-wide audit identified  
4 approximately 2600 ballots that the Floyd County Board of  
5 Elections and Registration failed to account for in its  
6 initial voting count certification. Investigation  
7 confirmed that the Respondent, who served as Floyd  
8 County's Chief Elections Official, failed to verify that  
9 all memory cards with votes for the November 2020 general  
10 election were properly uploaded and reconciled in the  
11 election management system. This mishap resulted in  
12 approximately 2600 votes not being included in the initial  
13 election certification results. Mr. Robert Brady  
14 presented to the Board that all votes were accounted for  
15 and the vote count could be certified. As a result, the  
16 Board certified the vote count. However, the state-wide  
17 audit of the votes showed that Floyd County had more  
18 ballots than what was reported in the initial vote  
19 certification.

20 On November 17th, 2020, members of the Floyd County  
21 Board of Elections and Registration oversaw the rescanning  
22 of ballots that was completed on November 17th, 2020, and  
23 the results were finalized on November 20th, 2020. Our  
24 recommendation is for former Chief Elections Clerk Robert  
25 Brady be referred to the AG's Office for Georgia election

1 code 21-2-379.11, 21-2-490(3)(b), and SEB rule 183-1-12-  
2 .12(b)(6).

3 MS. THOMAS: We have three people from Floyd County  
4 on the line, Ms. Virginia Harman, Ms. Vanessa Waddell, and  
5 Melanie Conrad. We'll first start with Virginia Harman,  
6 the Floyd County attorney.

7 MS. HARMAN: Yes. Thank you. I -- I just wanted to  
8 be sure that I understood that the Floyd County Board of  
9 Elections and Registration was also a Respondent. Ms.  
10 Watson, is there a recommendation as to the Board?

11 MS. WATSON: In the -- I do see in the report that  
12 Floyd County Board of Elections and Registration would be  
13 recommended also for the same violations.

14 MS. HARMAN: All right. Then, -- then, if -- if the  
15 recommendation as to the Board is also to refer to the  
16 AG's Office, I would like to -- to address that prior to  
17 the Board's vote. I do have on the -- available today our  
18 current Chair of our BOER, Doctor Melanie Conrad, our  
19 current interim Elections Clerk -- Chief Elections Clerk,  
20 Vanessa Waddell, and I also believe Mr. John Scott Husser  
21 [ph.] who was also a member of our BOER last November is  
22 online, although he may not have -- have added himself.

23 But the third member of our Board of Elections and  
24 Registration, Doctor Tom Rees, together with the two  
25 individuals I just mentioned, submitted affidavits in

1 support of this investigation, and I just want the Board  
2 to understand that these three individuals made up our  
3 Board of Elections and Registration last November. There  
4 is nothing in the report before you that indicates that  
5 any one of them or them acting as Board failed to meet  
6 their duties at any time last fall. They acted at all  
7 times in keeping with their legal duties and their general  
8 duty to act reasonably and responsibly in the conduction  
9 of the election and in the process of the initial  
10 certification of the results and then subsequently during  
11 the audit when the discrepancy and the returns was  
12 discovered. This Board, you could not ask for a harder  
13 working, more cooperative Board than these folks have been  
14 during all of that process, and Ms. Waddell, our current  
15 Interim Chief, was the assistant Chief Clerk at the time,  
16 ran the -- the January runoff election just superbly.

17 If you look at the affidavits that were submitted as  
18 part of this investigation, the Board at no time prior to  
19 or during the course of their original certification of  
20 the election results was aware that any problem had  
21 happened with any of our early voting scanners. In fact,  
22 the minutes of the Board of Elections meeting in which  
23 they voted to certify the elections indicate that Mr.  
24 Robert Brady, who was the then Chief Elections Clerk,  
25 reported to them that all machines had -- had performed as

1 they should have. They inquired of problems, were not  
2 told of any at that time, and they certified the election  
3 results. There was -- I mean, other than to have been on  
4 the floor during early voting when one of the scanners  
5 jammed because a voter had fanned herself with her ballot  
6 -- other than personally being there, there is nothing  
7 that this Board could have done that they didn't do.

8 This -- this entire discrepancy in voting, again,  
9 occurred when one particular scanner was jammed. That jam  
10 could not be rectified. Mr. Brady -- later we learned,  
11 only after the initial certification -- consulted with the  
12 Secretary of State's Office, and when the -- the scanner  
13 could not be utilized again, a new scanner was brought in,  
14 and all of the votes that had been cast up to the jammed  
15 ballot were rescanned. For reasons that I don't think  
16 anybody has been able to determine to date -- despite the  
17 fact that during the audit when the discrepancy was  
18 uncovered, with my participation and the Board's  
19 participation, a complete copy with all data and meta data  
20 of what was in our Dominion system at the time has been  
21 turned over to the Secretary of State's Office. No one  
22 understands why about half of the ballots were scanned and  
23 ultimately counted in the initial report and about half  
24 were not. We don't know the answer to that.

25 The key, I think, comes in the investigator's report

1 when it appears that the kind of reconciliation that we  
2 talked about earlier today in terms of looking at gross  
3 numbers of votes for each scanner and gross votes from  
4 each polling location -- that kind of simple  
5 reconciliation, if it had been done at the time by the  
6 Chief Elections Clerk, could have at least uncovered the  
7 problem, and it could have been reported to the Board, but  
8 that did not happen, and I think that's a key part of the  
9 investigator's summary that's before you. This Board did  
10 what they were supposed to do, and when the discrepancy  
11 was uncovered during the audit, they jumped in to do  
12 absolutely everything necessary to ensure that this  
13 discrepancy was immediately addresses, and they worked  
14 night and day to complete the audit in a timely manner and  
15 give good results.

16 So I don't -- I do not see anything in the record  
17 before you today that indicates any violation of either  
18 the Georgia code, the Elections Board rules, or the  
19 Board's general duty of responsible and good faith  
20 carrying out their duties as a Board, and I think it would  
21 be unfair to them to refer them over at this time. Again,  
22 the subsequent actions of the Board indicate a complete  
23 cooperation in this process.

24 We have a new member on the Board. We have an  
25 interim director who's performing incredibly well. We are

1 in the process of trying to totally restaff and redefine  
2 the duties of our elections folks, revamp our Elections  
3 Office. This Board is doing an incredible job at this  
4 time, as our staff is as well. So I would ask you to  
5 truly consider either dismissing or simply addressing the  
6 Board through letter form as to this particular case  
7 before you. And again, Dr. Conrad and our Interim Chief  
8 Elections Clerk, Ms. Waddell, are online if you'd like to  
9 ask them any questions.

10 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Harman.

11 MS. THOMAS: And we also have Tamera Gromala on the  
12 line. You can speak now. You can unmute yourself. You  
13 can speak now.

14 MS. GROMALA: I -- I -- can you hear me?

15 MS. THOMAS: Yes.

16 MS. GROMALA: Okay. I'm not the Mayor of Gromala.  
17 I'm not sure where that came from, but I am a Georgian,  
18 and I just have -- I really appreciate what she said.

19 MS. SULLIVAN: I'm so sorry. Who is this that's  
20 speaking?

21 MS. GROMALA: I'm sorry?

22 MS. SULLIVAN: What is your name?

23 MS. GROMALA: Tamera Gromala.

24 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you. Go ahead.

25 MS. GROMALA: I have a question. I really thought

1 that she presented her case well. However, regardless, in  
2 my opinion, it should never just be assumed that  
3 everything is at the up and up because we have issues, and  
4 I demand that it go further and not be dismissed.

5 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you for your comments.  
6 Is there someone else?

7 MS. THOMAS: Meredith Carter? You may speak now.

8 MS. CARTER: Yes. Yes. Can you hear me?

9 MS. THOMAS: Yes.

10 MS. SULLIVAN: Yes.

11 MS. CARTER: Okay. I'm Meredith Carter. I represent  
12 Robert Brady, and I just want to quickly address Ms.  
13 Harman's speech about the Board. I feel if Mr. Brady is  
14 going to the AG's Office, the Board needs to come with us.  
15 The -- when the Board was doing their investigation, Mr.  
16 Brady was on quarantine. He never even got a chance to  
17 answer any of their questions before they started throwing  
18 him under the bus as the sole person responsible for the  
19 ballots, and they were the ones that had told us they  
20 would like a chance to talk with him but still have not  
21 communicated with him to ask him exactly what had happened  
22 so they could investigate what went wrong with the  
23 machines and with the process, with everything and that  
24 they are absolutely responsible as long as they are the  
25 Board and were supposed to be overseeing the election.

1           One of their Board members just submitted an article  
2           in the paper about Mr. Brady and this hearing today, and  
3           in the background, they have a picture of her and another  
4           Board member who were absolutely present at the polling  
5           location when this was happening, so I dispute that they  
6           were not around as Ms. Harman indicated. They were right  
7           there with the Dominion -- the Dominion representative in  
8           that picture. There's pictures of them there, as well as  
9           Mr. Brady.

10           Mr. Brady denies any -- I'm sorry -- denies any  
11           intent to jeopardize this election, and we would -- we  
12           welcome the opportunity to go to the AG's Office along  
13           with the Board, so the AG's Office can get testimony from  
14           all members involved and hear exactly from Mr. Brady's  
15           mouth exactly what happened. Thank you.

16           MS. THOMAS: We have one more person that raised  
17           their hand to speak. Mark Swanson, you may now speak.

18           MR. SWANSON: Yes. Yes. Thank you for recognizing  
19           me. I just have a couple of points I would throw in to  
20           what the previous person would comment. According to the  
21           bylaws of the Floyd County Board of Elections under  
22           Article 4, Officers, the Chairman of the Board shall be  
23           the chief executive officer of the Board and shall  
24           generally supervise, direct, and control the  
25           administration of the affairs of the Board pursuant to law

1 and duly adopt the resolutions of the Board. So I believe  
2 that the Board has direct oversight and has been given the  
3 authority to have oversight over the elections and that  
4 includes any negative issues that come up. They are  
5 ultimately responsible for it, and there was a comment  
6 made about the -- about the elections being run well.  
7 Subsequent to the general election and the runoff contest,  
8 there was a discrepancy of votes submitted by Floyd County  
9 of three hundred and some odd votes, and that was the  
10 single largest percentage discrepancy of votes in the  
11 entire state.

12 Furthermore, we've been doing some looking at the  
13 records, and it appears that there are outstanding  
14 violations of the ballot drop box procedures that were  
15 incurred during both elections where un-oathed individuals  
16 were picking up ballots. And I've also submitted a letter  
17 to our county commission that I'll be happy to provide  
18 this body that cites another 15 possible violations of  
19 election law that have occurred during the last couple  
20 elections, and so I would also recommend that the entire  
21 Board be recommended over with Robert Brady.

22 MS. SULLIVAN: Mr. Swanson, any additional  
23 allegations you have regarding elections in Floyd County,  
24 you are welcome to -- and please do -- forward your  
25 complaints to the Secretary of State's Office for

1 investigation, but they will not be a part of this file at  
2 this time in this case, but thank you for your comments.

3 MR. SWANSON: Thank you.

4 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay. We have two more people that  
5 would like to address the Board.

6 MS. THOMAS: First is Vicky Sutton. You may now  
7 speak.

8 MS. SUTTON: Yes. My name is Vicky Sutton, and I  
9 voted in Floyd County on October the 13th in person, and  
10 on November the 6th, I checked my voter account, and my  
11 vote was not there. So I called the Secretary of State's  
12 Office, and they told me we're not showing that you voted,  
13 and so I called our Elections Office, and they told me  
14 that my ballot was upstairs to be counted. Okay. This  
15 was on November the 6th in the morning, and I'm, like,  
16 okay, and she said, well, give me your phone number, and  
17 I'll call you back when we get it in. And so I did, and  
18 at 3:30, I hadn't heard from them, so I called the  
19 Secretary of State's Office and was instructed to go to  
20 the local elections office to see what was going on  
21 because there was a 5 o'clock deadline. And so -- excuse  
22 me. I've been running. I'm sorry. I was out jogging  
23 just a minute ago.

24 So I went into the local elections office here in  
25 Floyd County, and I walked up to the desk, gave them my

1 license. They looked me up. She came back, and she said  
2 -- and this was at 4:30 in the afternoon. She said your  
3 ballot is upstairs to be keyed in, and I said excuse me,  
4 but I voted in person on October 13th. This is November  
5 the 6th. Why is my ballot just now getting keyed in? And  
6 she said did you sign a white piece of paper when you  
7 voted? And I said yes, ma'am, and she said, great. We'll  
8 get you in, and I said by 5 o'clock? And she said yes.

9 Well, at 9 o'clock that night, it still wasn't there.  
10 I contacted Brad Raffensperger --

11 MS. SULLIVAN: Ms. Sutton?

12 MS. SUTTON: Yes?

13 MS. SULLIVAN: I'm sorry to -- I'm sorry to interrupt  
14 you, but the -- the -- what you're describing right now is  
15 not a part of this particular case. If you have a  
16 complaint that you would like to make against Floyd  
17 County, please submit that as a separate complaint.

18 MS. SUTTON: Okay.

19 MS. SULLIVAN: Because these allegations are not  
20 related to the cases that are before us in part with these  
21 allegations --

22 MS. SUTTON: Okay. I understand -- I completely  
23 understand that. I just heard her say that there was no  
24 problems, you know, reported before they found the 2700  
25 ballots, and that's what I was trying to tell you. I went

1 to their office and told them there was problems, and no  
2 one's listening to me.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: Okay.

4 MS. SUTTON: So I understand that, and I will contact  
5 whoever I need to, but that's the only reason I'm speaking  
6 up is because she said that, and I went, no, wait a  
7 minute. I went there and told them my ballot was missing,  
8 so...

9 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. Thank you, Ms. Sutton.

10 MS. SUTTON: Okay.

11 MS. SULLIVAN: And please feel free -- we can open up  
12 a separate case if you forward the complaint to the  
13 Secretary of State's Office. Thank you.

14 MS. THOMAS: And then we have one more person. Ouida  
15 Sams, you may now speak.

16 MS. SAMS: Yes. That's Ouida Sams. I was writing a  
17 letter to the Board concerning my concerns about Mr. Brady  
18 being so disorganized, and so they knew about Mr. Brady  
19 then because several things had happened prior to that,  
20 and so I have to agree that they're doing an excellent job  
21 with the new Interim Chief of Elections, but they did know  
22 about Mr. Brady and his disorganization and how he had  
23 things not in order, and I brought that to their attention  
24 on July 8th, 2020 when I sent a letter to Mr. -- to Dr.  
25 Tom Rees. During that period, I was the local president

1 of the local NAACP Floyd County branch, and so they were  
2 aware of the problems.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Sams. Thank you very  
4 much.

5 MS. SAMS: Now, is there a -- is there a --

6 MS. SULLIVAN: I'm sorry? Do any Board members have  
7 any questions, or are we ready to make a motion?

8 MR. MASHBURN: I don't have any questions. I'm ready  
9 to make a motion, and that is regardless of anything, the  
10 inescapable fact is that but for the audit and the  
11 recount, 2600 hundred people's votes wouldn't have been  
12 counted, and everything in the system is built into the  
13 system to try and avoid that happening, and here it  
14 happened. So I think that we accept -- I move that we  
15 accept the recommendation of the inspectors and refer both  
16 Robert Brady and the Floyd County Board of Elections to  
17 the Attorney General's Office.

18 MS. SULLIVAN: I'll second that motion. Is there any  
19 further discussion?

20 MS. GHAZAL: Chair Sullivan, I would just like to ask  
21 as this -- assuming that this case does get referred to  
22 Attorney General's Office, that there be some attention to  
23 whether or not this is a training issue and an issue that  
24 the Secretary of State should be addressing more  
25 generally, whether or not we should be adopting further

1 rules to avoid this from happening, or whether this was  
2 truly an individual problem that should not recur on the  
3 basis of personal changes.

4 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. I agree.

5 MR. MASHBURN: And it is one of the provisions of 202  
6 that is very important that's just been passed where the  
7 county has to -- has to report how many votes it had cast  
8 so there will be a lot of eyes able to check on how many  
9 votes have cast versus how many have been counted, and  
10 that's an important detail that 202 has in it.

11 MS. SULLIVAN: And we have a motion and a second.  
12 All in favor, please signify by saying aye.

13 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

14 MS. SULLIVAN: Any opposed? None opposed, and that  
15 motion passes. The next new investigation case we have  
16 today is 2020-205, Fulton County. Ms. Watson?

17 MS. WATSON: Yes. In November of 2020, we received 8  
18 complaints regarding the processing of uniform and  
19 overseas citizen absentee voting ballots during the Fulton  
20 County 2020 general election. Out of those eight, there  
21 were three that were confirmed. The first was a voter,  
22 Cory Riscek [ph.] requested but did not receive an  
23 absentee ballot. Voter Jessica Vaughan's [ph.] absentee  
24 ballot was mailed to her address of record instead of her  
25 overseas address during the general election, and voter

1 Mr. Kim's [ph.] absentee ballot was mailed to her -- Ms.  
2 Kim's absentee ballot was mailed to her address of record  
3 instead of her overseas address during the Fulton County  
4 2020 general election. Our recommendation is for former  
5 Fulton County Chief Registrar Ralph Jones and Fulton  
6 County Registration and Elections Division be bound over  
7 to the Attorney General's Office for a violation of 21-2-  
8 381(a)(2), 21-2-73, preservation of primary and election  
9 records, when the Elections Office was unable to find a  
10 2020 general election application for absentee ballot for  
11 voter Jessican Vaughan, and SEB rule 183-1-14-.11, when  
12 the Elections Office failed to issue an absentee ballot to  
13 voter Ms. Kim at her requested overseas address.

14 MS. THOMAS: We have David Lowman and Shamira  
15 Marshall from Fulton County on the line.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: Go ahead, Mr. Lowman.

17 MR. LOWMAN: Good afternoon. Good afternoon. With  
18 respect to the way that absentee ballots are processed in  
19 Fulton County, the department has been reorganized and new  
20 positions have been created so the process is different,  
21 will be different going forward. So with respect to the  
22 three remaining allegations, I would ask that a letter of  
23 instruction be issued, and if the Board has any specific  
24 questions, Ms. Marshall is online to answer any of those.  
25 Thanks.

1 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you. Do any of the Board  
2 members have any questions?

3 MR. MASHBURN: No questions, Matt Mashburn. I --

4 MS. GHAZAL: This is Sara Ghazal.

5 MR. MASHBURN: -- make a motion that we accept the  
6 recommendation. I'm sorry.

7 MS. GHAZAL: I'm sorry. I just had a very quick  
8 question.

9 MR. MASHBURN: Sara, I'm sorry. I'm sorry, Sara.

10 MS. GHAZAL: That's okay. It's okay, part of the  
11 problem with doing these remotely. I -- my question is  
12 whether or not any of these voters were advised to do an  
13 emergency write-in ballot which is the -- a less optimal  
14 but at least a -- a solution that UOCAVA voters uniquely  
15 have to avoid being disenfranchised. Was that option made  
16 available to these voters?

17 MR. LOWMAN: This is Mr. Lowman. It's my  
18 understanding that the second allegation that that was  
19 what happened and was completed in this case.

20 MS. GHAZAL: I'm glad to hear that, and I hope that  
21 that is a -- a practice that will be pursued. Hopefully,  
22 we won't see cases like this moving forward, but on the  
23 other hand, this needs to be standard practice that they  
24 are offered to all voters who -- because overseas voters,  
25 I have been one myself, and I understand the challenges,

1 and this option needs to be publicized for folks who don't  
2 get their ballots.

3 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. Ghazal. Any further  
4 questions? I believe, Mr. Mashburn, you were going to  
5 make a motion.

6 MR. MASHBURN: I was going to make a motion that we  
7 accept the recommendation of the investigators and refer  
8 it to the Attorney General.

9 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion. I'll second that.  
10 Is there any further discussion? All in favor, please say  
11 aye.

12 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

13 MS. SULLIVAN: And there's none opposed. That motion  
14 passes. The last thing on our agenda today is the  
15 Attorney General's report. At this point, I'll recognize  
16 the Attorney General's Office to do that, their report.  
17 Ms. Charlene McGowan, please go ahead.

18 MS. MCGOWAN: Thank you, Madam Chair, and good  
19 afternoon, Board members. For the Attorney General's  
20 report for this meeting, I'm presenting a number of  
21 consent orders as well as two orders of dismissal for the  
22 cases that are laid out in the agenda. I'm happy to  
23 answer any questions that any of the Board members may  
24 have about individual cases, but it is our Office's  
25 recommendation that these consent orders and orders of

1 dismissal be approved by the Board.

2 MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you, Ms. McGowan.

3 MR. MASHBURN: Unless any Board member has a  
4 question, I move that they be accepted in bulk.

5 MS. GHAZAL: I second.

6 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion. Do we have -- we  
7 have a motion and a second. Is there any further  
8 discussion? All in favor, please signify by saying aye.

9 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

10 MS. SULLIVAN: And there are none opposed, and that  
11 motion passes. That concludes our agenda today. I will  
12 entertain a motion to adjourn at this time.

13 MR. MASHBURN: Move to dismiss -- move to adjourn.  
14 Sorry.

15 MS. LE: Second.

16 MS. SULLIVAN: We have a motion and a second, and all  
17 in favor, please signify by saying aye.

18 THE BOARD MEMBERS: Aye.

19 MS. SULLIVAN: And the meeting is adjourned. Thank  
20 you all for attending.

21 (Meeting adjourned 1:45 P.M.)
